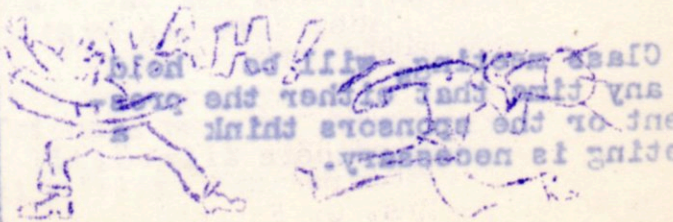

FROM THE EDITOR

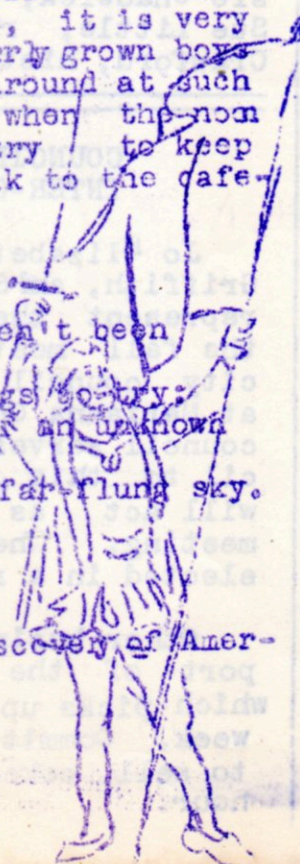

One of our pupils, Mary K. Walker, has moved. Torris Duncan and Cebron Thomas are still out picking cotton.

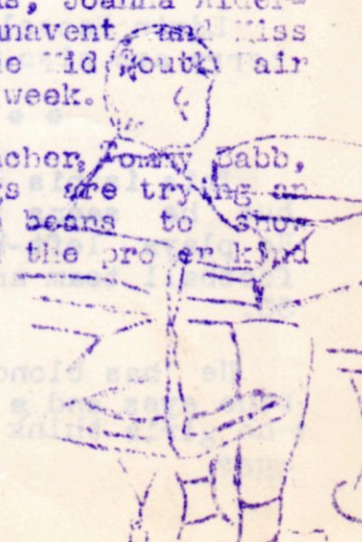

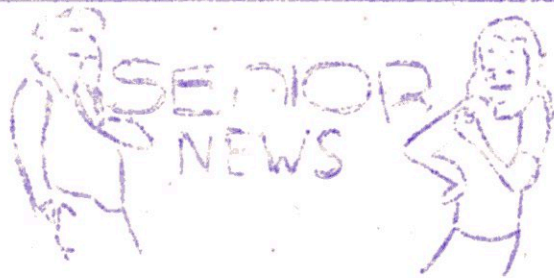
HOLIDAY IS WELCOMED

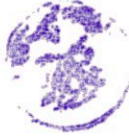





The next home game will be with Marianna, February 10.

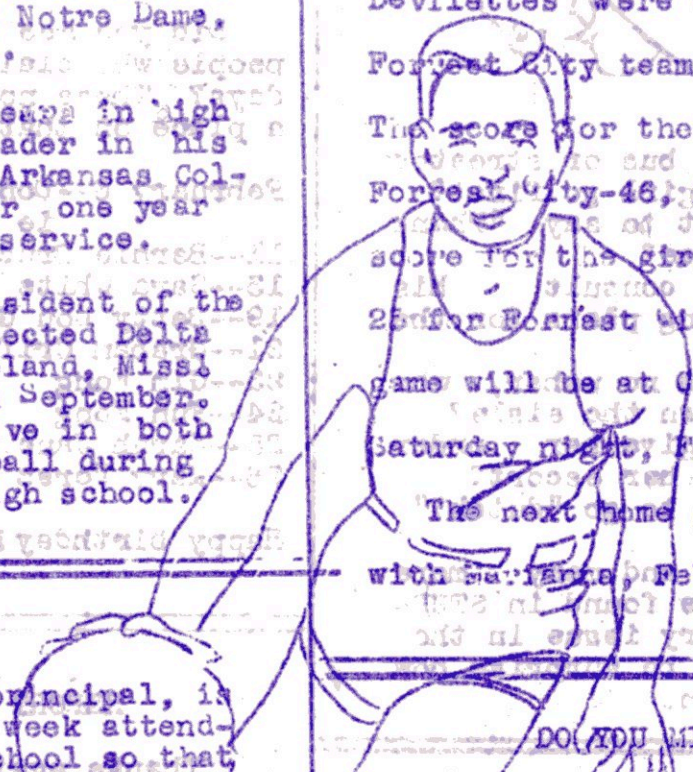

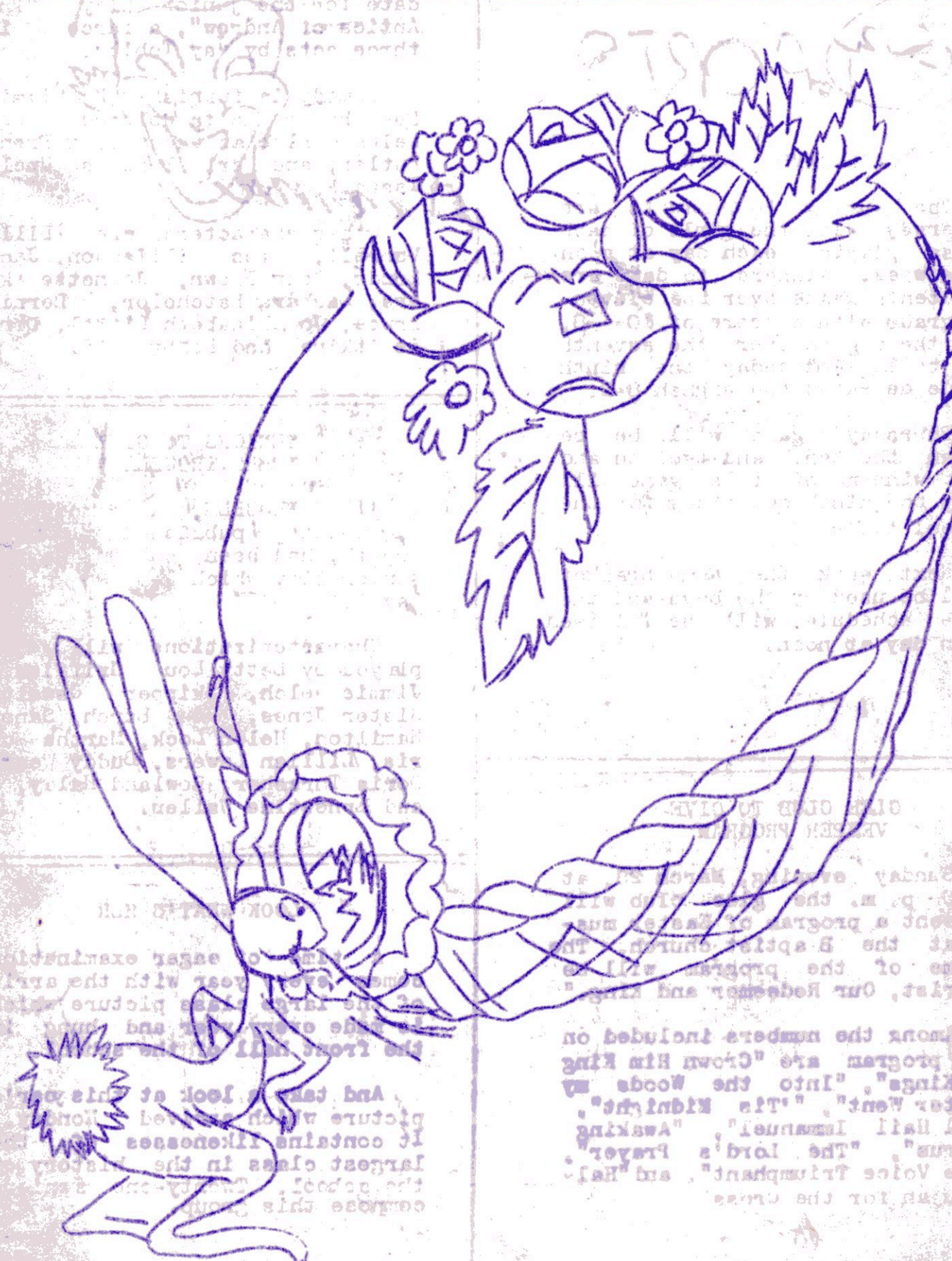

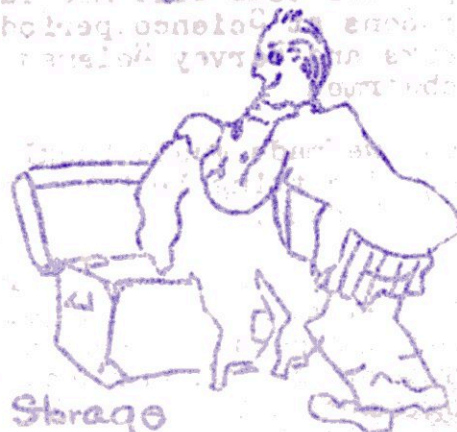
PEA MEMBERS ATTEND STATE CONVENTION

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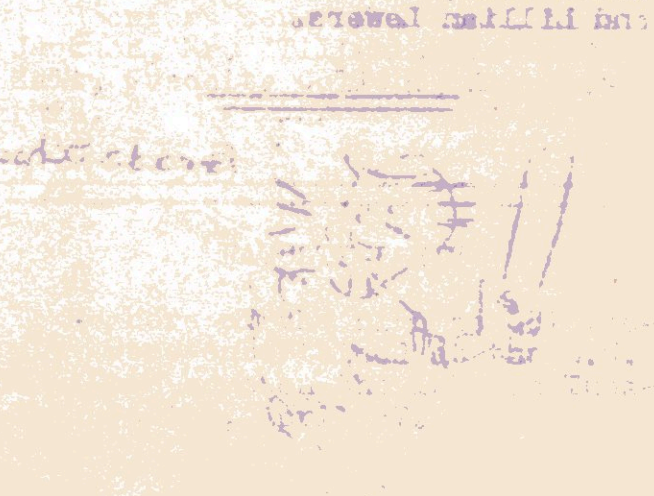
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F. F. A. NOTES

SENIOR GIRLS WIN FIRST PLACE IN SOFTBALL

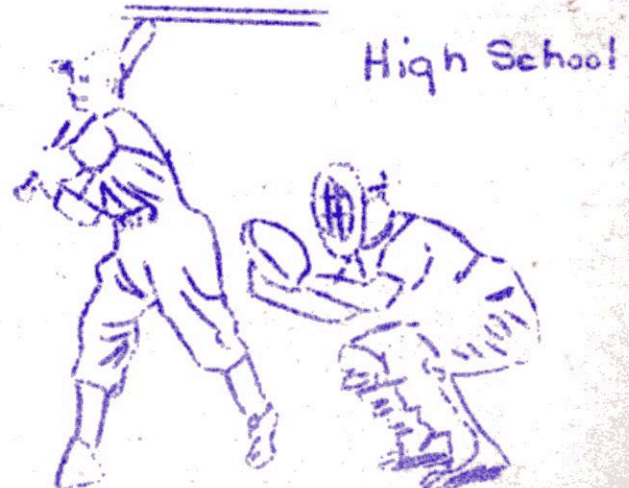
