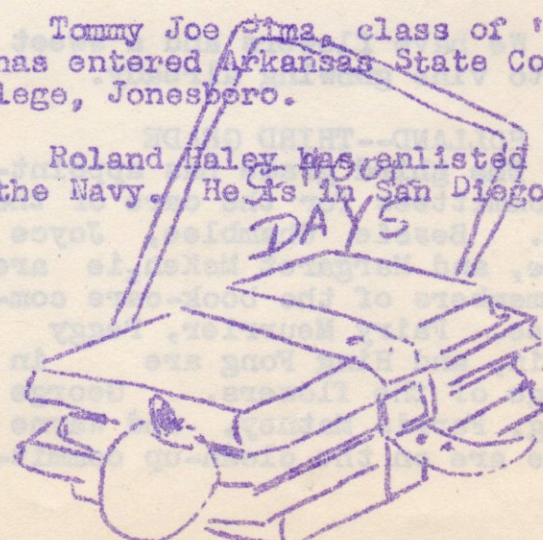

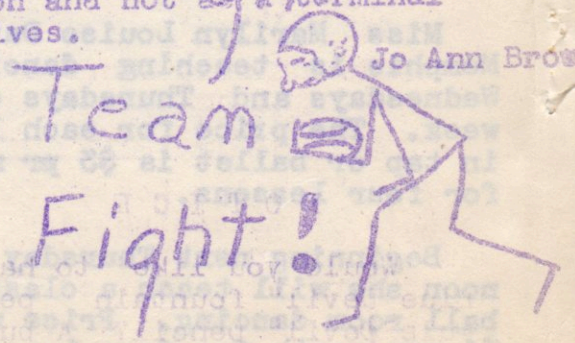
...even of still boy blow

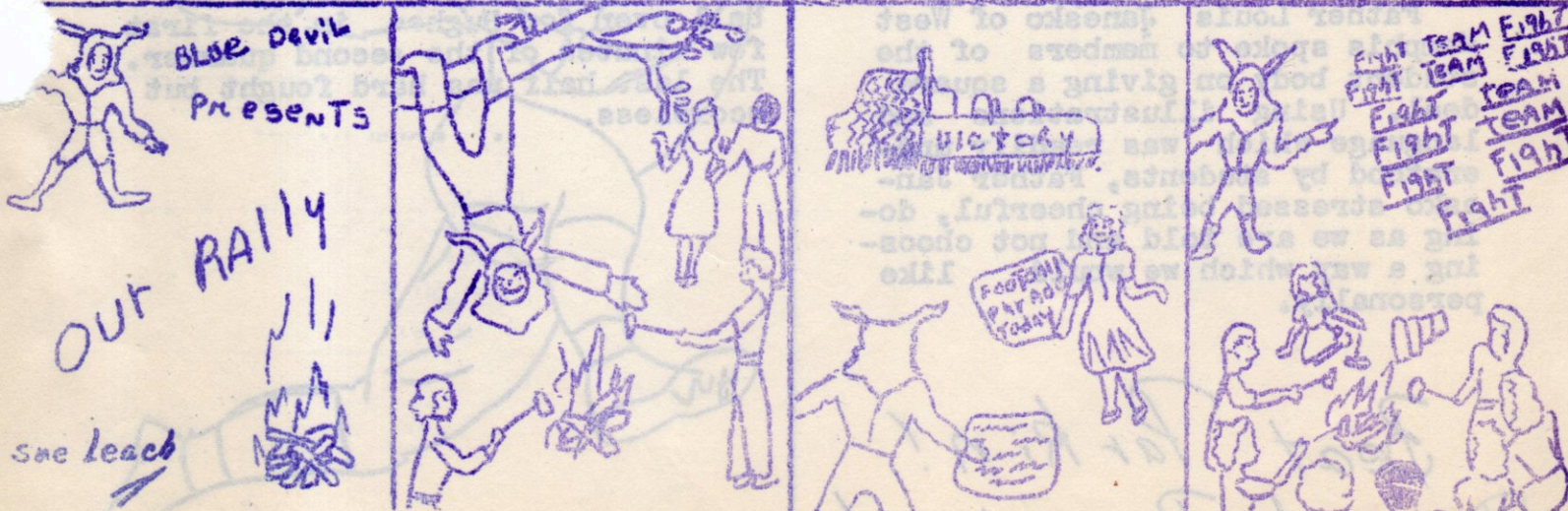

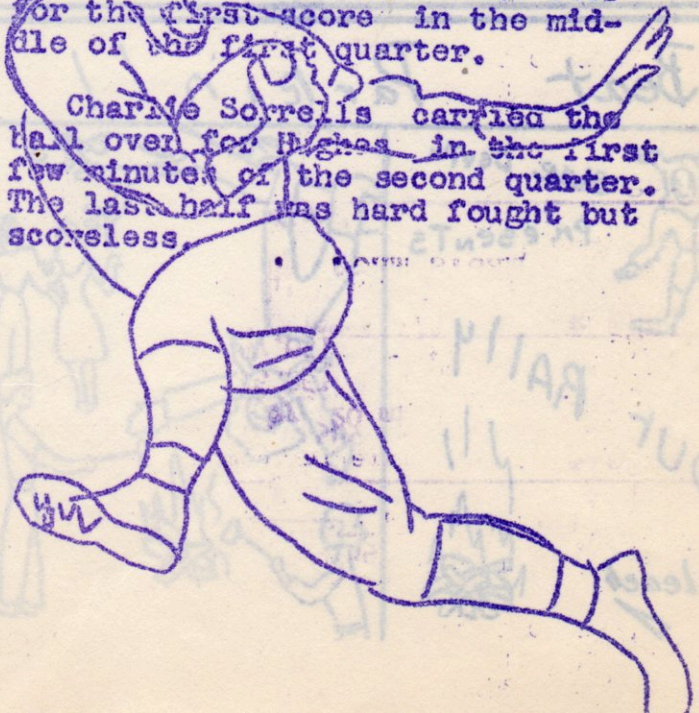
Marion, however, came back on the next kick-off and passed and ran the ball over for a touchdown. They also made the extra point and went ahead 7-6.

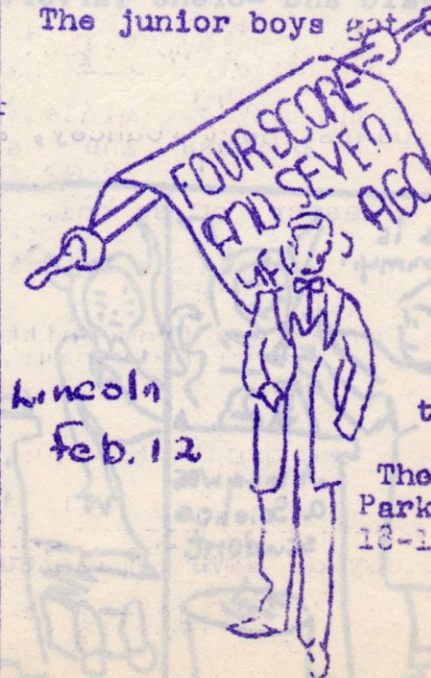
F. T. A. MEETS

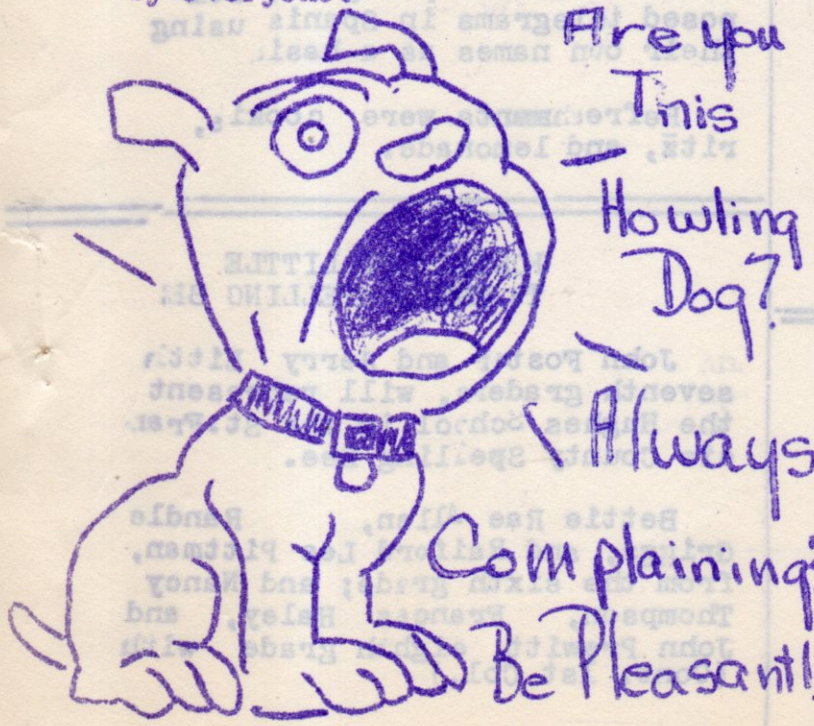
COUNCIL MEETING SLATED FOR APRIL 7-9

PRESBYTERIAN MINISTER SPEAKS TO STUDENT BODY

Rev. James Foagertie, Mari-anna, spoke to the assembly last Thursday on the general theme of "Time--Its Use and Origin". He explained time as originating with God to be used by man for the glorification of God. Although it is important to the whole existence, it seems to be human to want to stretch time.

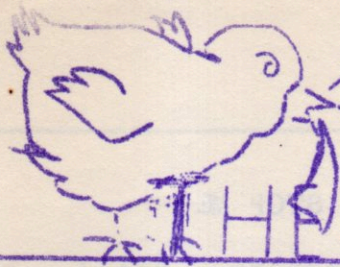

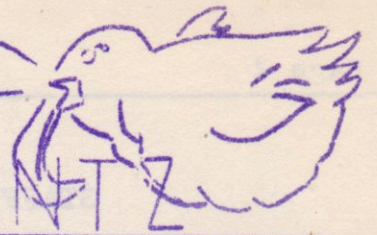

After officers were elected they were installed with a candle light service.

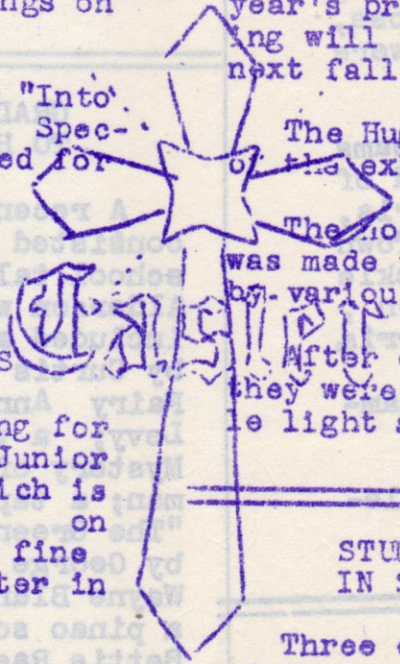

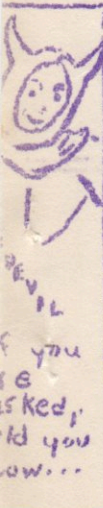

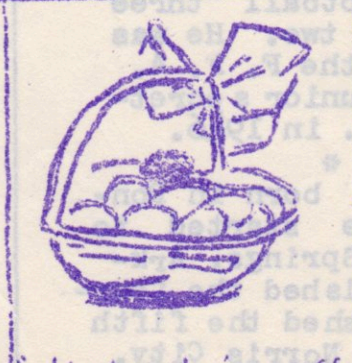
