Coach England made an interesting talk on mental attitudes. His subject was tied in very carefully with football and life.

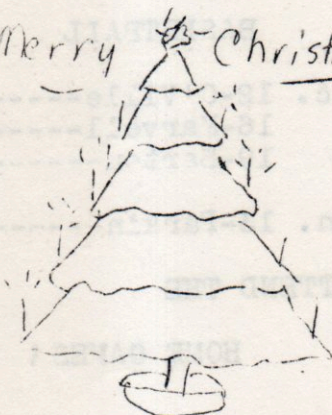
JUNIOR GIRLS LOSE TO F. CITY

FHA ATTENDS FALL FEDERATION MEETING

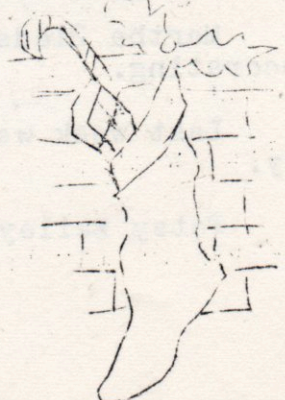

OUR TOWN'S NEEDS IN ITS WAR ON TUBERCULOSIS

DRIVE FOR FUNDS IS UNDERWAY

WHAT TUBERCULOSIS MEANS TO ME

Day after day I sit here watching new victims come into the sanatorium. They are people of all ages. My name is not important but I just wonder if healthy people realize how lucky they are.

After I became ill I wondered really what caused my sickness. Could it be the flies from the insanitary city dump? Maybe it was a person who was affected but did not know because he didn't get an x-ray when the mobile unit came.

There are certain places in my hometown unfit for animals to live in. However, people go on as if everything were perfect and they don't seem to make improvement.

I remember last spring when the mobile unit came to our town. A lot of people got an x-ray, but there were more that didn't than did.

Perhaps if everyone got together and worked to make improvements a lot of people would not be sick from the dreaded disease--- tuberculosis.

This week has been designated in Hughes School as "Bangle Week". Students have been given an opportunity to contribute funds to the tuberculosis fund for St. Francis County. Each person in school who has contributed is wearing a red double-barred cross.

70% of the money raised will remain in the county. 15% goes to the state association, 5% goes to national, while 1% is used for research.

During last year there were 176 known cases in St. Francis County. This is a disease which strikes with little warning. Therefore, we need to be prepared for any emergency.

If you have not given to this worthwhile cause, give now, and give generously.

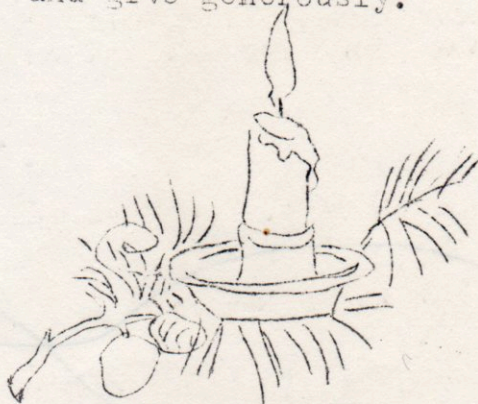
How discouraged may a person feel? How low on earth can you feel lying flat on your back day in and day out for months at a time?

I can tell you now you can feel pretty low after completing ten years of medical training, and then begin on your internship only to be brought down from your career by tuberculosis.

When my case was discovered, one lung was immediately collapsed, and then I was to lie in a bed for at least two years. At the end of these two dark years I was told I couldn't practice the type of medicine for which I had been training.

How discouraging can life become? Studying to be a doctor for ten years, using medical instruments for ten years, but never discover you have tuberculosis.

I think you can see from my experience why I took up x-ray as my profession and what tuberculosis means to me.

Sophomore girls appeared as victors of the girls intramural tourney when they edged out a one point victory over the juniors and also picked up five points on the plaque.

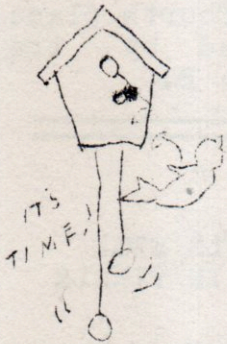
