ENROLLMENT NEARS 800 MARK NOW

Record enrollment has been reached this year in Hughes School. This first day enrollment was 763 with 472 in the grade school and 287 in the high school.

The figure at the end of the second week has risen to 492 for the grades and 300 in high school.

The first grade has the largest number of students, 89. The second grade has 79; third, 86; fourth 81; fifth 82; and sixth, 55. Each grade has three teachers except the sixth which has only two.

All funds of the Hughes High organizations are now deposited in one fund called the Hughes School Activity Fund. All money must be deposited through the office and receipts and expenditures are handled by Miss McKemie. Checks must be co-signed by either Mr. Worrell or Mr. Nelson.

This method of handling school money comes as the result of school board action as all school accounts are subject to audit.

Any organization desiring to know their financial status may check with the official ledger in the office.

Hughes High gym floor is being sanded and refinished in anticipation of the 1956-57 basketball season.

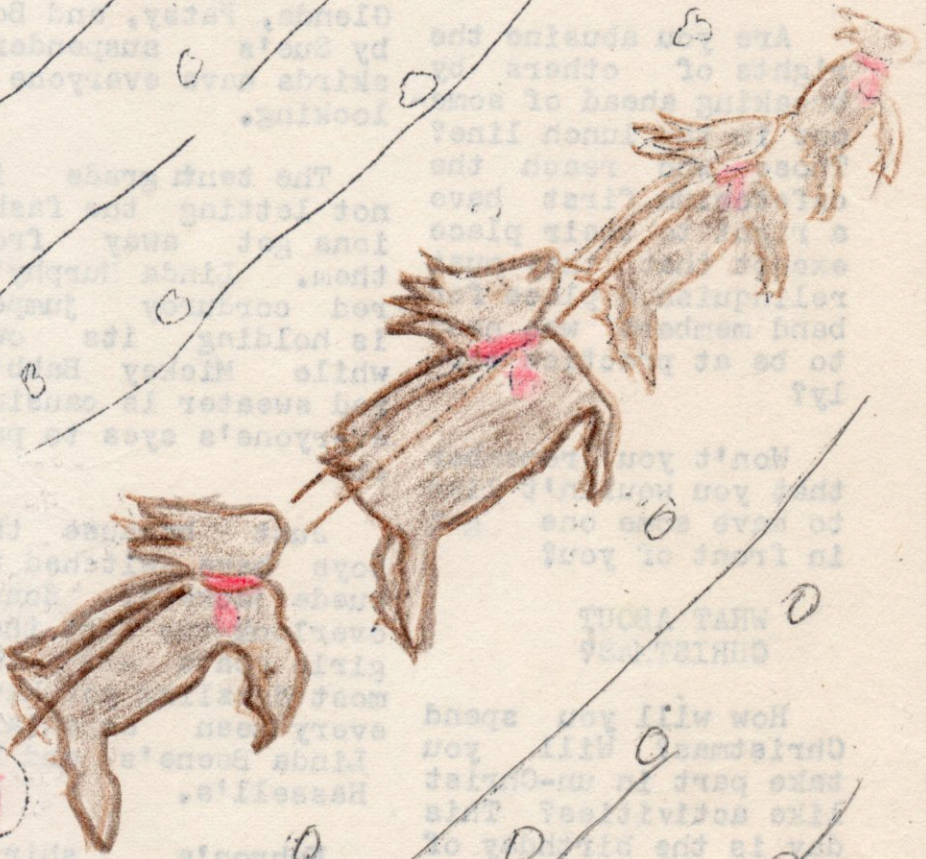
The floor was started two weeks ago because of the ruling that the lane under the basket had to be widened.

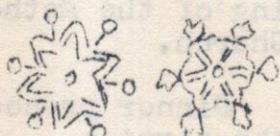
Hughes Blue Devils lost to the Marianna Porcupines 58-46 on Tuesday, December 4.

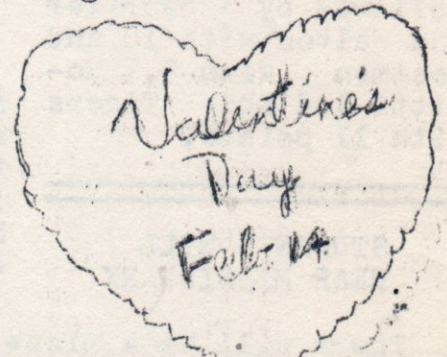

OUR SCHOOL EATS--  
IN QUANTITIES

An average of 12,092 lunches were served over a five-month period in the lunchroom. From October through February an average of 643 students ate in the cafeteria per day.

During the month of February, 16,379 cartons of milk were served to students with their lunches. The milk bill was \$900.85.

The bread bill was \$233.95 for February. One slice of bread costs nearly one cent, yet there is much bread wasted every day. In the cafeteria, two slices are almost as expensive as one carton of milk.

It takes from \$25 to \$27 to serve ice cream for one day.

The government supplements six cents for every lunch which is served to help carry on the lunch program.

Through all this careful planning, a new mixer has been bought which cost \$545

Balancing the budget of the lunchroom is a job and takes lots of time, thought, and patience. Students

## HISTORY OF THE CLASS OF 1957

I am the class of 1957. I became a part of the Hughes School when I came in existence in 1945. 33 little boys and 27 little girls eagerly came to our first day here. We were greeted by a tin black haired, black eyed teacher who was enthusiastic about each one of us.

By the end of the second six weeks period eight of us were so in love with school that we hadn't missed a day of school--Connie Lovell, Nancy Schwmm, and Lobby Griggs.

By February Jeanie Fong, James Horton, and Patsy Mealer were a part of our group, and a few more perfect in attendance for this month: Willie Jean Moodie, Jo Rose Levy, Peggy Ingram, Donna Harmon, Cliff Wise, Clary Lunsford, and Thomas Beene. The only one in attendance for the six months period was Clary. Robert Miller was out for more than a week because of illness.

Perhaps the highlight of this year was a play for P. T. A. "Who Stole the Tarts?" in which Johnny Collier played the Piper's Son. James Hood, Little Red Riding Hood, and Clary was Puss in Boots.

Mary Ellen Burton greeted the second graders as they arrived in the present elementary building on September 1947. Early that month Cliff Wise celebrated his 7th birthday and had friends to a party at his home. Johnny Collier missed the party because he had flu at the same time.

January 31, 1947 was a day not likely to be forgotten by either boys or girls. Kuhron Meurrier joined the class along with Walter Rena Brown. Another birthday party was given for the room by Jo Rose Levy. Her mother brought ice cream and cake and cake and show a movie.

Early we became travelers. Sherry and Jerry MacMillian went to Searcy for a week-end with grandmother and John Russell went to Forrest City for a week-end with grandmother.

John Russell also gave a party for us. Every one learned "Twelve the Night Before Christmas" and we won the PTA attendance prize.

Miss Burton was ill and Mrs. Vooth taught the room. Roy Masquez and Bob Turner entered.

March 14, 1947, Gail Selph moved from Mavelville and joined the second grade.

For a long time Miss Burton worked with the group on a Tom Thumb wedding, but the bride was involved in a car accident in Tennessee and the wedding was postponed.

Perfect in attendance toward the end of the year were Thomas Allen Beene, John Russell Collier, Bobby James Griggs, Cliff Wise, and Cora Aikens.

By fall 1947 the class had grown so large that Mrs. Sorrells was employed as a third grade teacher to help Miss Turnage.

This was a momentous year. We learned to make capital letters and to use them in writing sentences. We studied telephoning and talked over a real one. For Halloween we made dolls from socks, clothespins and pipe cleaners. We had a new window box made from cheese boxes which John Russell brought. Mr. Olive cut ducks for end pieces on the boxes. We organized a Junior Audubon Club, and Jeanie Fong was elected president. Vice president was Bob Turner; John Russell was secretary. Harvey Resiman was program chairman. We also made some music booklets.

This year Gale Selph moved from Hughes but Patsy Chadwick joined the class from the Heth School. Aaron Franks was out 10 days because of illness and Sars Lou was out for several months.

Harvey played the "Ghost" in Mrs. Peck's piano recital and on March 4 we gave a PTA program. Mahala Ray read some spring poems. Clary Emsford, Donna Harmon, Jen Doss, Kuhron, and Harvey were characters in the play "Grown-ups for A Day." John Russell was the announcer.

Miss Hazel Knight and Mrs. Ruby Davenport greeted fourth graders in the fall of 1948. And we were all becoming quite artistic. We placed attractive linoleum tops on our reading tables and added pretty blue-green book cases. Our music pupils were John Russell, Mahala, Jo Rose, and Clary. Our dancing pupils were Jen, Mahala, and Jo Rose.

John Russell, Mahala, Martha Ann, and Thomas Beene were our rummage sale committee and planned to spend money for curtains, an aquarium, record player and records. We bought new books TOBY TYLER, ALICE IN WONDERLAND, AND LITTLE WOMEN.

Our cocoon which we had watched so long became a monarch butterfly. We made shields and decorated them with chalk after we had studied the African Congo region.

We decorated the curtains we had bought and each of us colored a child from another land on a curtain.

On the sick list were John Russell Collier who had pneumonia and Clary who had the mumps.

In our talent show John Griggs and Kuhron sang "Put your arms around Me." and Harvey sang "Ah Sweet Mystery of Life."

We had some real scholars too. John Russell, Emmett, Clary, Bob Turner, Betty Sue Lawson, Jo Rose Levy and Virginia Scarlett all made straight S's.

Miss Jones was the fifth grade teacher. For Halloween we were part of a big circus parade. We had two giraffes, three clowns. One had a sign reading "Moving Pictchers" and the other had almost everything. That was the year we had a Five-Wall Club. Our first officers were John Russell, the President; Bob Turner the Vice President, Tenda Fraizer the secretary, Harvey was treasurer; and Kuhron was program chairman. His helpers were Jeanie and Mahala Ray. The club was interested in hiking and music, birds, flowers, and books.

Clary was elected our eighth grade president in 1952. Jeanie and John Russell went to the St. Francis county spelling Bee. Jeanie won second but had to sit down on the word "diphtheria." For our first junior high assembly Charles Ed and Howard Chism gave a skit entitled "Hole in the Fence." Harvey sang "California" and Sherry, Betty Woods, and Patsy White sang "Seven Lonely Days!" Jerry and Emmett imitated Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis. On the same program Patsy Mealer and Gale Selph read the preamble to the constitution and led the pledge to the flag.

John Russell Collier was our ninth grade president. Carrying on our usual record officers were boys and the boys have continued to furnish this type leadership through this year.

Gossip said that Robert Stoddard was big hit with Gail Selph. Martha Beene had an interest in Room 528 of the Baptist Hospital. Vernell and Kuhron were sitting around in a Ford with a glass top. Jerry and Barbara developed a romance during the Thanksgiving holidays.

Nine of our group became Beta members: John Russell, Harvey, George Young, Barbara Chism, Joyce Odom, Jeanie, Charles Ed, Clary, and Sara Lou.

Harvey was our tenth grade president. Betty Medlin and Barbara Chism were cheerleaders and Harvey won the Ping Pong singles. Barbara was Beta club historian.

Kuhron and Vernell were no longer steadies but he still preferred blondes, Vernell decided he wasn't the only interesting boy at Bright Future, and Kuhron said to Toots "You're the One,"

Johnny Collier told Charlotte Burchfield "Stop chasing me Baby, It ain't gonna do you no good." He was wearing the road to West Memphis to see Rache.

John Pounders returned from Earle and there were plenty of OHS and AHS from the girls. Allen Prescott returned for a visit and brightened up Gail's days.

We need not tell you much about last year. You can remember well the things that happened to you and to us. Harvey was the editor of the paper and Jeanie was yearbook editor. Emmett was the president of the class. The Beta Club started its Scholarship Banner and we were the first group to win it.

We are still writing our history this year. We have maintained our good scholarship record all the way. We have taken interest in events on several occasions. We have been part of district champion football teams. We have done our part to build the basketball spirit at HHS. We are a vital part of the track team. We can boast with pride of our athletic ability, our leadership ability, and our scholarship record. We expect to be counted among those who continue to be good citizens and "Wherever we roam; we'll never be alone; with the memories of old Hughes High.

We gave a health play for FTA and among our good deeds we counted the buying of a radio for our room.

Harvey was sick for a week that year. Danny Alexander joined our group. John Griggs gave us a copy of the book, "Dick Tracey". Charles Ed gave us WOOFUS and Clary gave SON ~~OF THE BLACK STALLION~~.

Mrs. Lorine Jett and Mrs. Lester Leabetter divided the sixth grade group. John Pounders and Neil Hopper came in from Heth.

Carrying out our artistic bent we spent time painting figures. Harvey played "Cadet's Review" at the piano recital and Barbara Chism played "Polish Dances". Jerry McMillion and Johnny Collier brought goldfish and Sherry McMillion and Barbara brought Christmas tree decorations except the most important ornament. Thomas Beane brought the star.

Among our social events was a Valentine party to which Mahala and Kuhron bought the cokes. John Edward Pounders celebrated his birthday on March 23.

Kuhron and Mahala Ray were May Day king and queen and the attendants were Sara Lou and Jerry.

Sara Lou and Johnny were representatives to the safety council and Thomas Beane was elected to Student Council.

We were a class to put first things first and on one Monday 50% of us reported being in Sunday School the day before.

We still had some scholars. John Russell, Bob Turner, and Charles Ed made 100 on their six weeks arithmetic test and Jeanie made 100 on the midterm spelling test. Top grades at the semester went to Barbara, Harvey and John Griggs.

In September 1951 we had several in the seventh grade. Bob Turner was our class president; Kuhron was vice-president; John Russell was secretary; and Harvey was treasurer. Each day we tried to show our love for our country and Clary and Cliff raised and lowered the flag each day.

Our honor roll students were John Griggs, Bob Turner, Ying yon Hong, John Russell, Jeanie, Clara Moore, and Barbara Chism.

Joyce Odom joined the class January 11, 1952.

In the rumor circles were such problems as Mahala trying to decide between Johnny Collier and Bob Turner. While Johnny was busy trying to get Cliff to make up his mind between Mary Ann Hammock and Fairy Ann. It was then that Kuhron and Toots enjoyed Saturday night rides. Mahala made a big change or maybe a small change. From John Russell to Clary.

Our student council was host to the Inter-City council group and Harvey sang "Deary" on the entertainment portion of the program entitled "The Gay Nineties".

In the May Day program Kuhron and Mahala crowned Bessie Lynn and Curtis as May Day king and queen.
