HUGHES SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY SUFFER LOSS OF FRIEND AND LEADER IN EDUCATION

Twenty-one years of outstanding leadership in the Hughes community were completed by Superintendent Roy Nelson on Saturday, September 6. Death claimed this friend of education who left hundreds of friends in Hughes and over the state.

Mr. Nelson's service as superintendent of schools is marked by a campus which has grown from two to eight buildings and an enrollment increase from about 325 to 1000.

High School Enrollment Reaches High Mark

Enrollment at the end of the second week totals 805 in grades 1-12. Junior and senior high enrollment is at an all time high at this time with 329 enrolled in 7-12.

The senior class is the largest in the history of HHS with 35 on roll. The seventh is the largest of the upper grades with 65 registered. There are 50 eighth graders; 57 freshmen, 49 sophomores and 41 juniors.

Only 476 have enrolled in grades 1-6, and rooms have from 27 to 35 students.

Two new seniors have transferred to Hughes. They are Elda Godwin from Los Angeles, California, and Ann Griggs, from Marianna.

Mr. Nelson was a life member of National Education Association and of the Arkansas Education Association. He had furnished educational leadership in many activities of the profession in Arkansas.

He was a Rotarian-- a former president and charter member.

He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church and teacher of an adult Sunday School class.

Students will miss his counsel, his support of school activities, his interest in them and their problems.

Acting for the Hughes School Board is Mr. Bert C. Pouncey, Jr. who has served as president of the board for a number of years.

School was dismissed on Monday, September 8 in memory of Mr. Nelson.

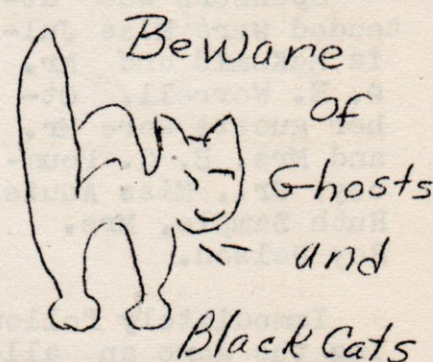
Johnson added two more touchdowns in the fourth quarter and Calloway added one extra point to end the scoring for the night.

Ruby and Sandra look like twins in their red outfits.

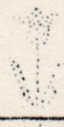
Mrs. Worrell brightens the library with her red and pink stripped shoes, and Miss Sample is wearing a polka dot dress which speaks of spring.

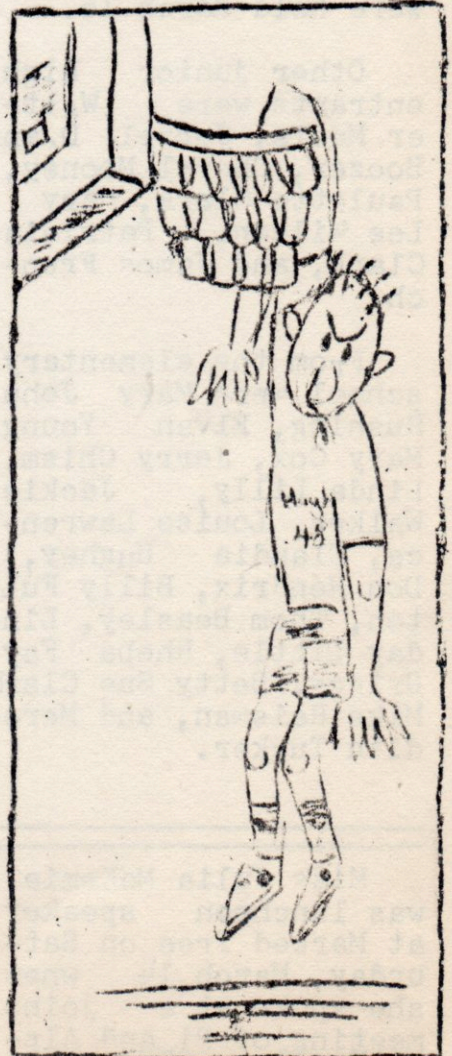

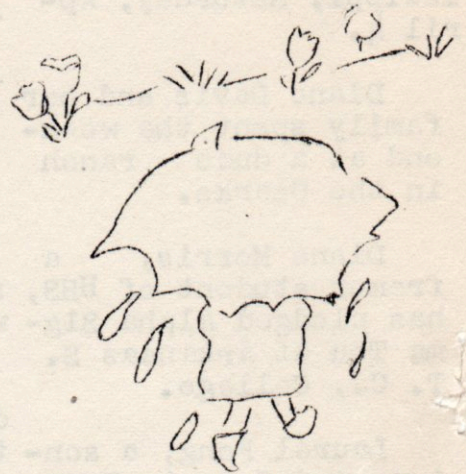

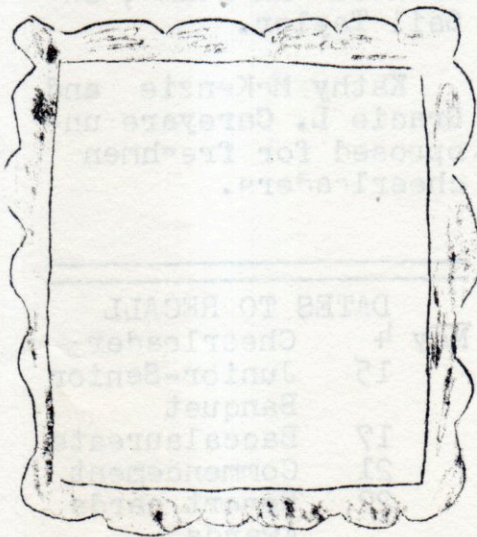

FOUR STATE RECORDS

Hughes Blue Devils broke four district records as they won the district 6B championship at Holly Grove with $57\frac{1}{2}$ points over arch rival Clarendon who came in second with $50\frac{1}{2}$. The meet was held on Thursday and Friday, April 23-24.

Hughes Blue Devils now lead in four events in the state "B" according to the event times turned into the ARKANSAS GAZETTE.

The events are 440 relay, 100 yard dash, 440 dash and the shot put. Hughes is tied for first in the 880 relay with Charleston.

Hughes captured nine first places and tied for another in 15 events, Clarendon won four events and Hazen one. Hughes jumped to a seven point lead with two events remaining when Clarendon was disqualified in the 880 relay for cutting corners. This is Hughes' first district championship team in senior track.

Calvin Stackhouse and Wilson Pittman, who have led the Devils in scoring, set three records between them. Stackhouse won the 100 yard dash in 9.9 seconds (New record). The old record was 10.2 seconds. He won the 440 dash in 51.5 seconds (new record). Old record was 53 seconds. Pittman threw the shot put 48 feet $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches for a new record. The old state record was held by Johnny Collier. Pittman won the discus with a throw of 122 feet 2 inches.

Jerry Christian is second in the high hurdles. David Clark is third in the 880 run and Wilson Pittman is fourth in the discus. Hughes also holds the third place in the mile relay.

Boys who won first or second at district will go to the state meet in Little Rock, Friday, May 1.

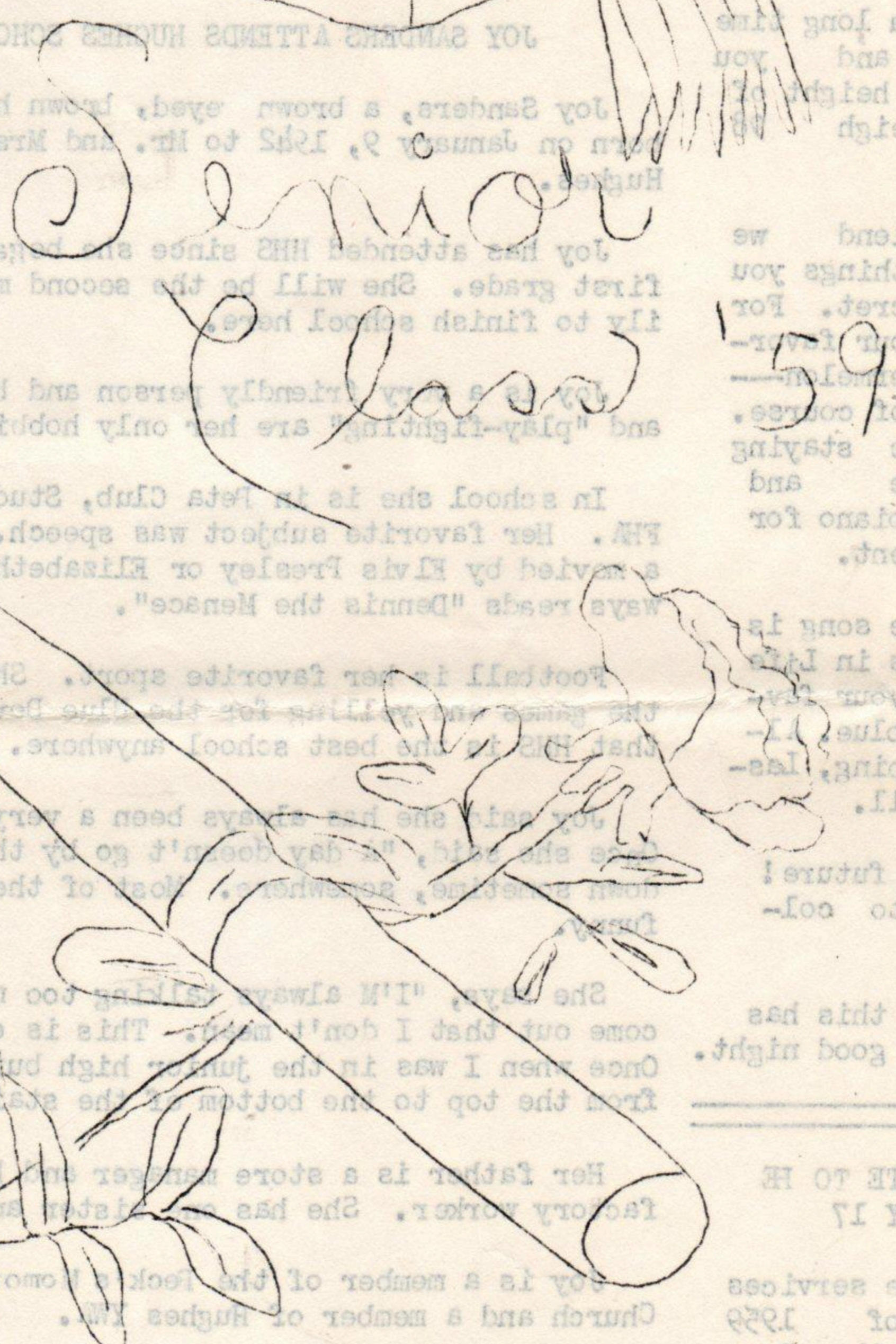

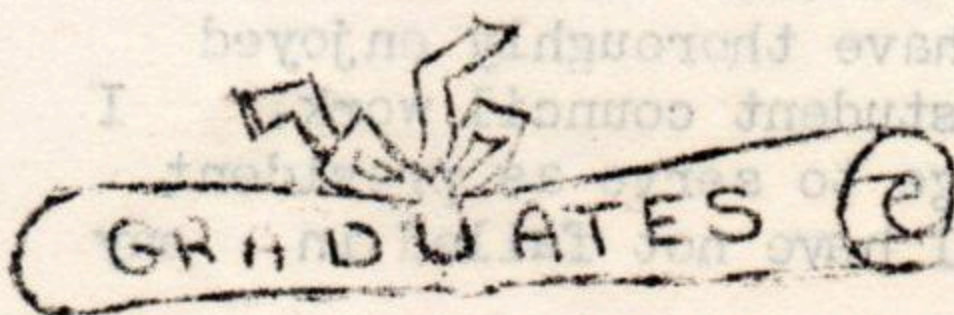
Carolyn has one sister and one brother. Her father is manager of Standard Ice Company and her mother is a housewife.

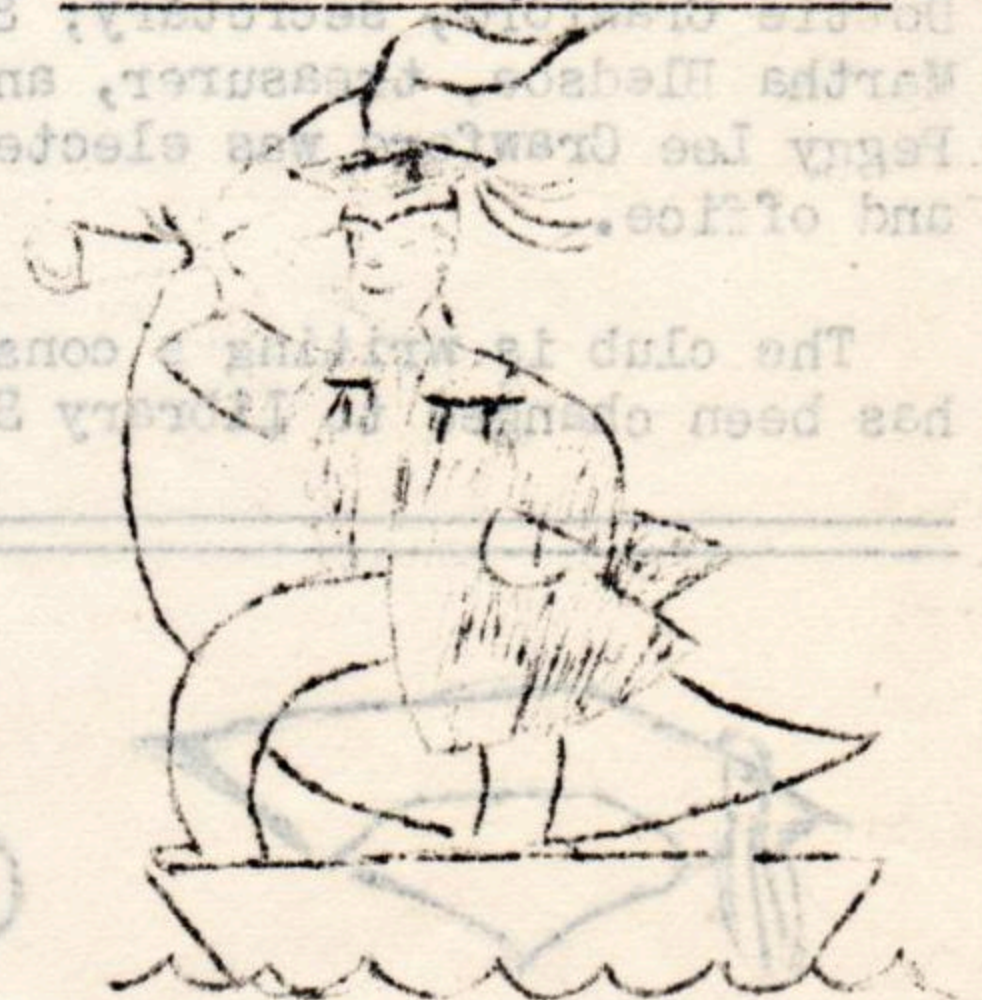

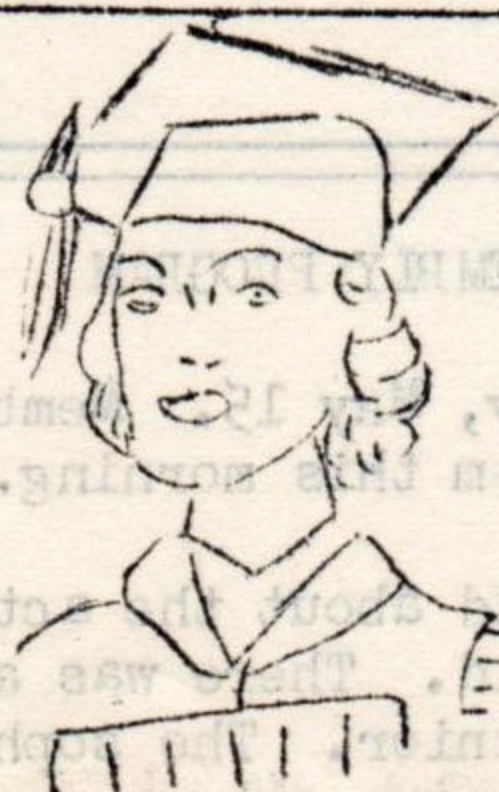
