1959-1960 SCHOOL YEAR BEGINS AT HHS

School opened on Monday, September 7 with 742 students registering for grades 1-12. Enrollment in the junior-senior high was 336 and 412 registered for the first six grades.

Seniors are listing 45 on their roll which makes the largest senior class to begin a school year at HHS. There are 40 juniors; 48 sophomores; and 44 freshmen. 83 are in the eighth grade and 76 in the seventh.

There are fifteen on the junior-senior faculty and eighteen grade school faculty members.

Mr. Roy L. Stobaugh has begun his first year as superintendent in Hughes.

Outstanding among policies begun by Mr. Stobaugh is an absentee system which encourages each student to make-up any of the work missed while out of school for any reason.

Players out for the first year or who have returned after a year's absence are: M. Babb, end; J. Burch, end; and B. Stimpson, halfback.

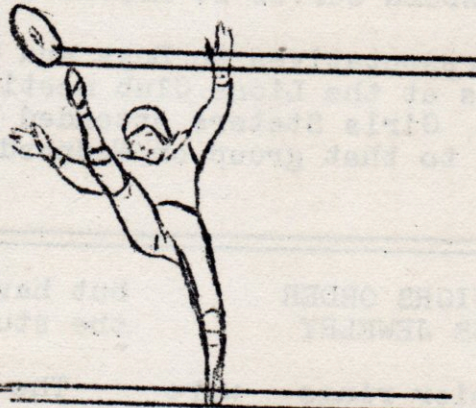
**BLUE DEVILS WIN

Members of the junior class are urged to register now in order to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test on March 8, 1960. This is a three hour test of educational development in five areas: English usage, mathematics usage, social studies reading, natural science reading, and word usage.

These tests are given each year by the National Merit Corporation as a part of the nation's largest independent scholarship program. Last year 550,000 students competed in 14,500 schools for more than \$3½ million.

After the tests students will receive an interpretative folder that reports individual test results for comparison with scores of students throughout the country.

Freshmen and sophomores will be eligible for the National Educational Development Tests on the same date.

Fee for either test is \$1.00 and students should register now with Miss McKemie. Deadline for registration is December 15.

Mr. Bert C. Pouncey Jr. gave the senior high assembly program on December 14 when he discussed the divine power as a guide to everyone's way of living.

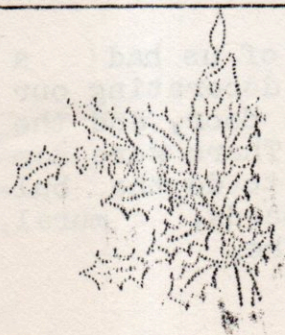

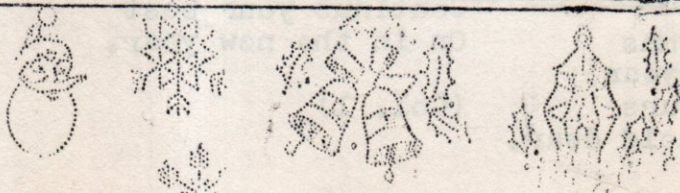

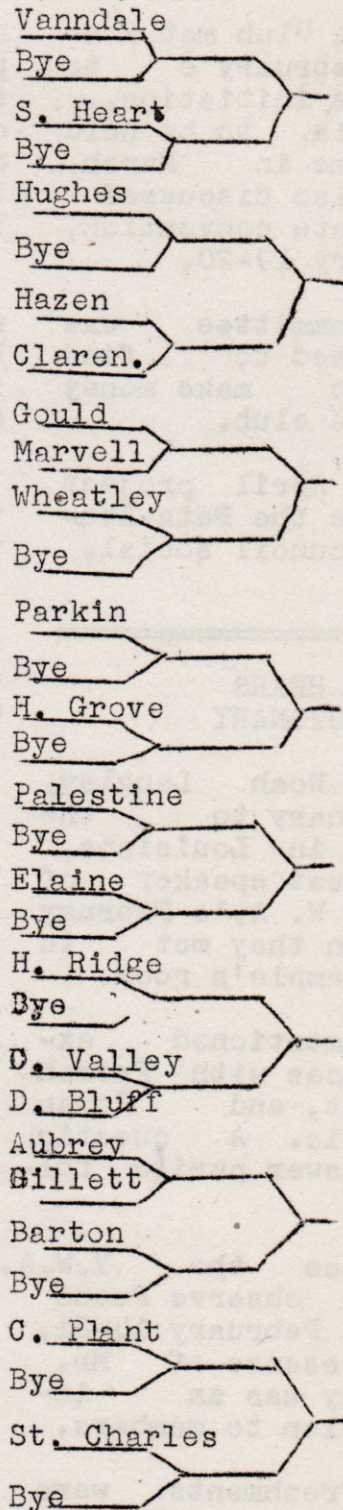
The score was tied in the last quarter but with a few seconds remaining, Marvell made two free shots.

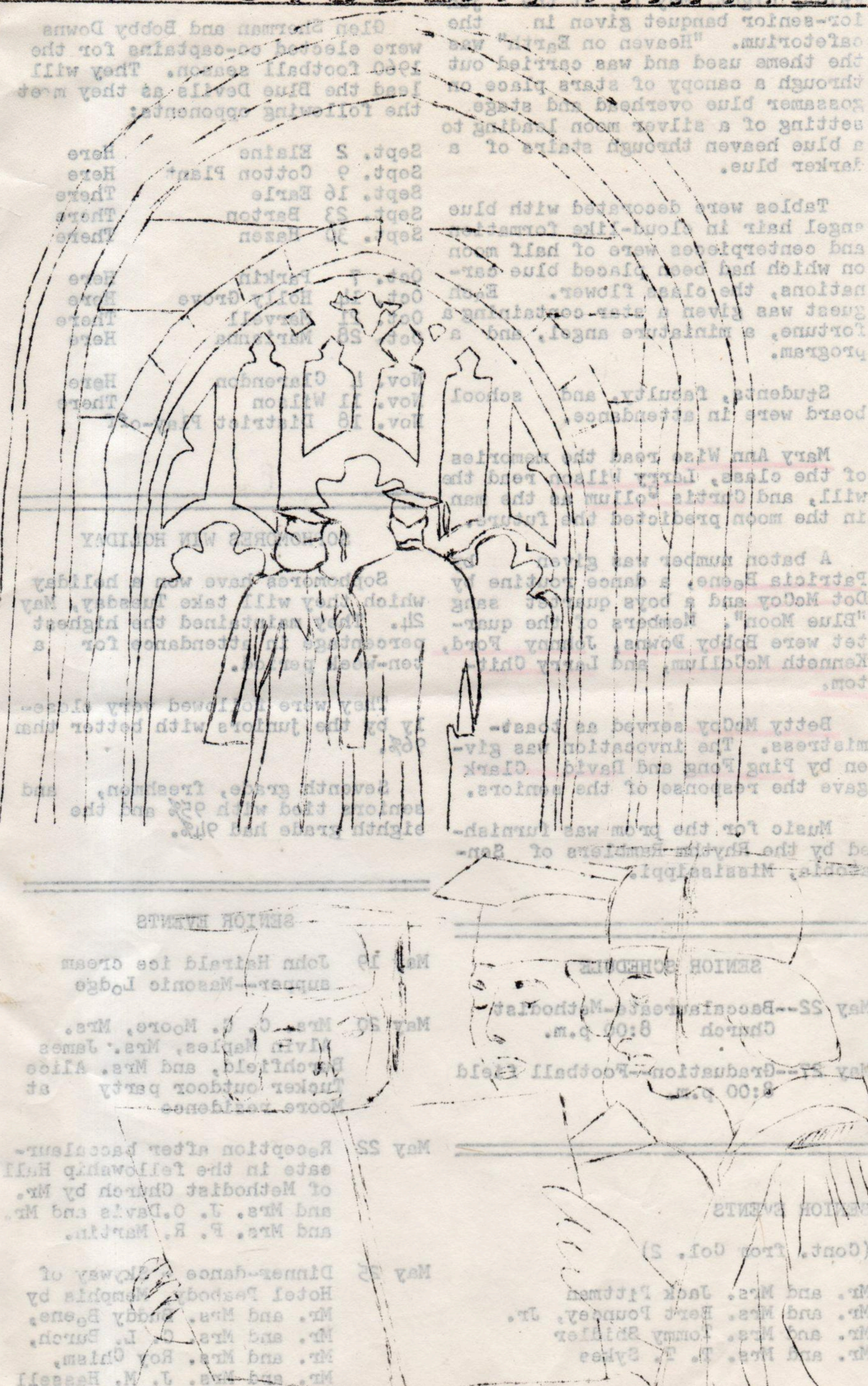
