Friday we took Christmas cards which we had made and addressed and mailed them at the post office.

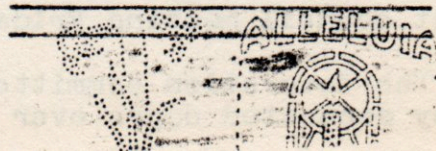
Miss Gibbons' Third:

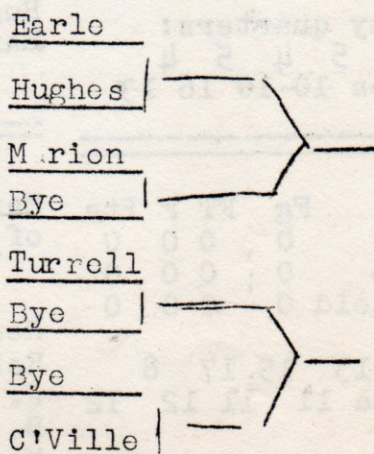

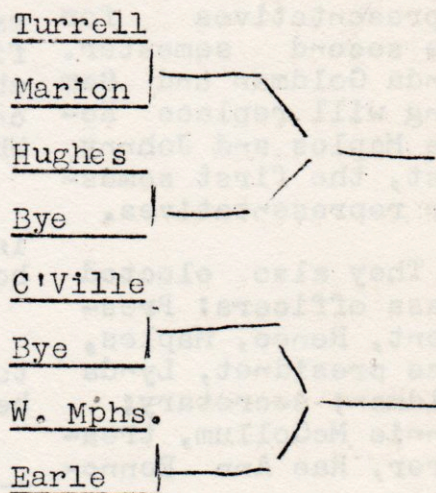
JUNIOR BOYS-COUNTY TOURNAMENT-FEB. 1-4

Jorgen is an American Field Service student and will graduate from Marianna High School. He is sponsored by the school's student council.

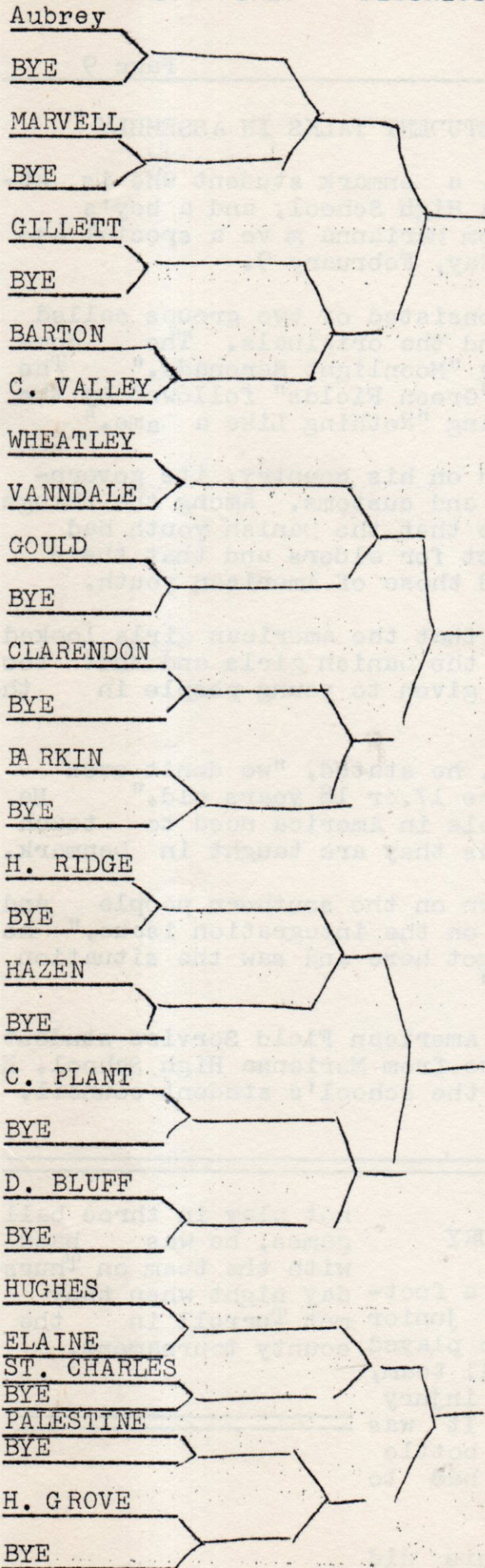

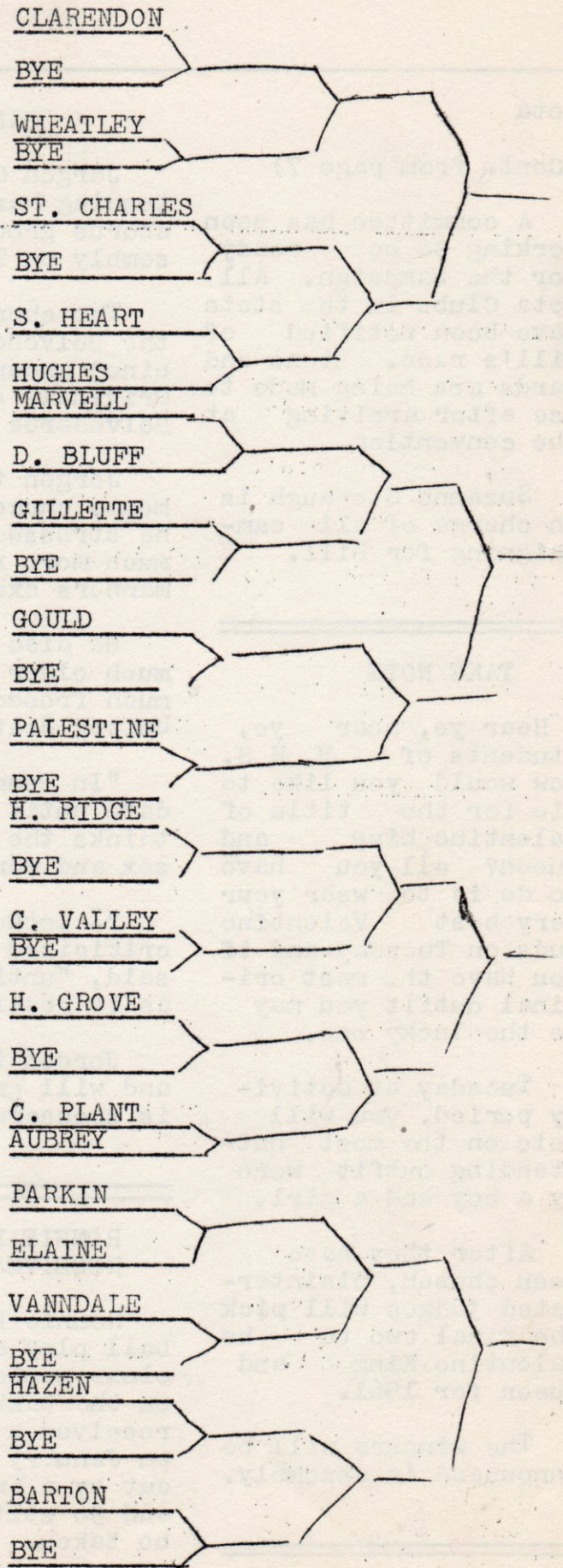

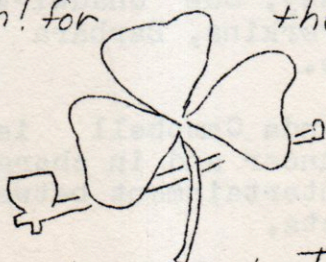

Mary Alice survived the operation and now her nose is 1/4 inch long and her mouth is barely big enough to bet a straw in it.

She expects to return to school next week.

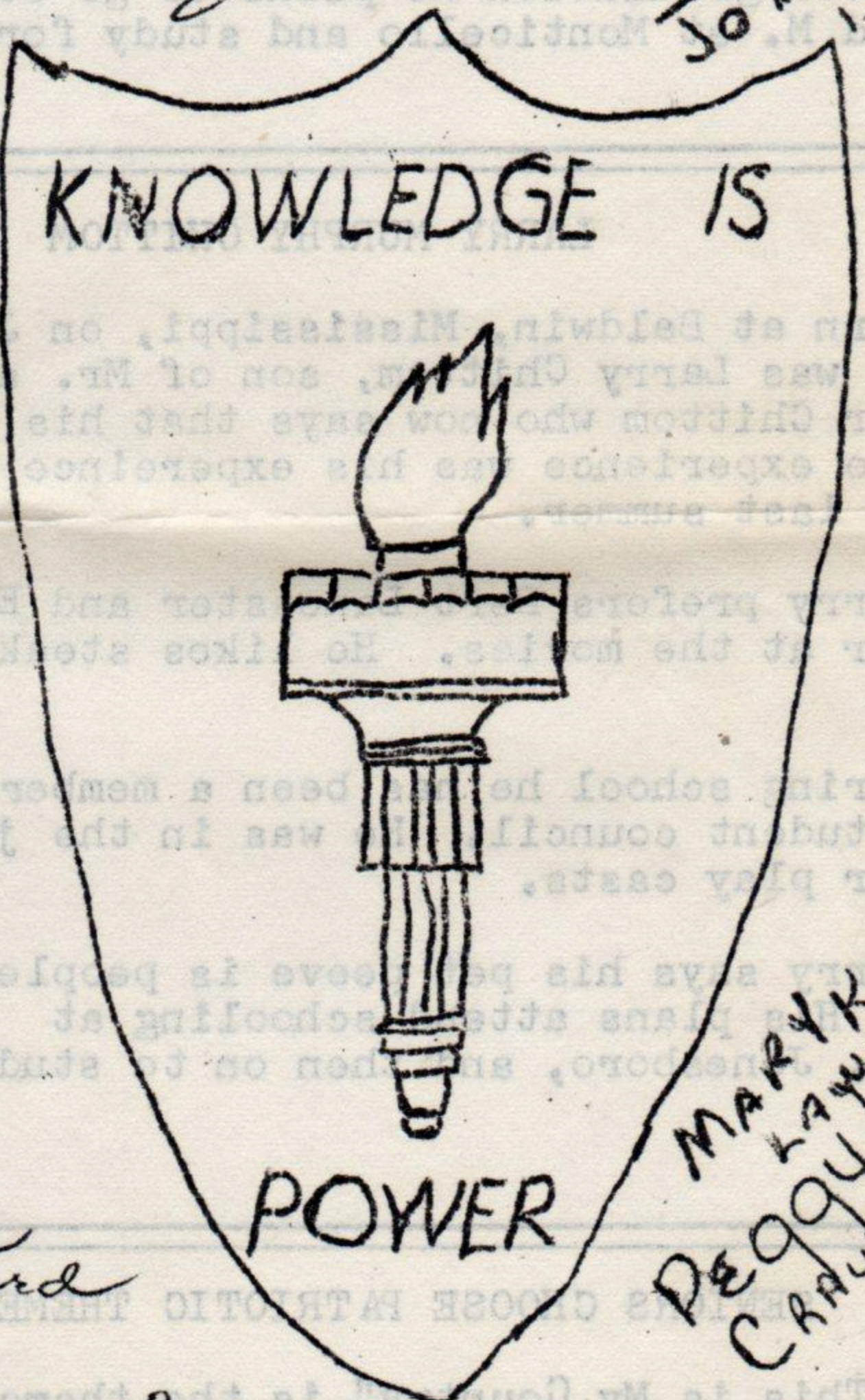

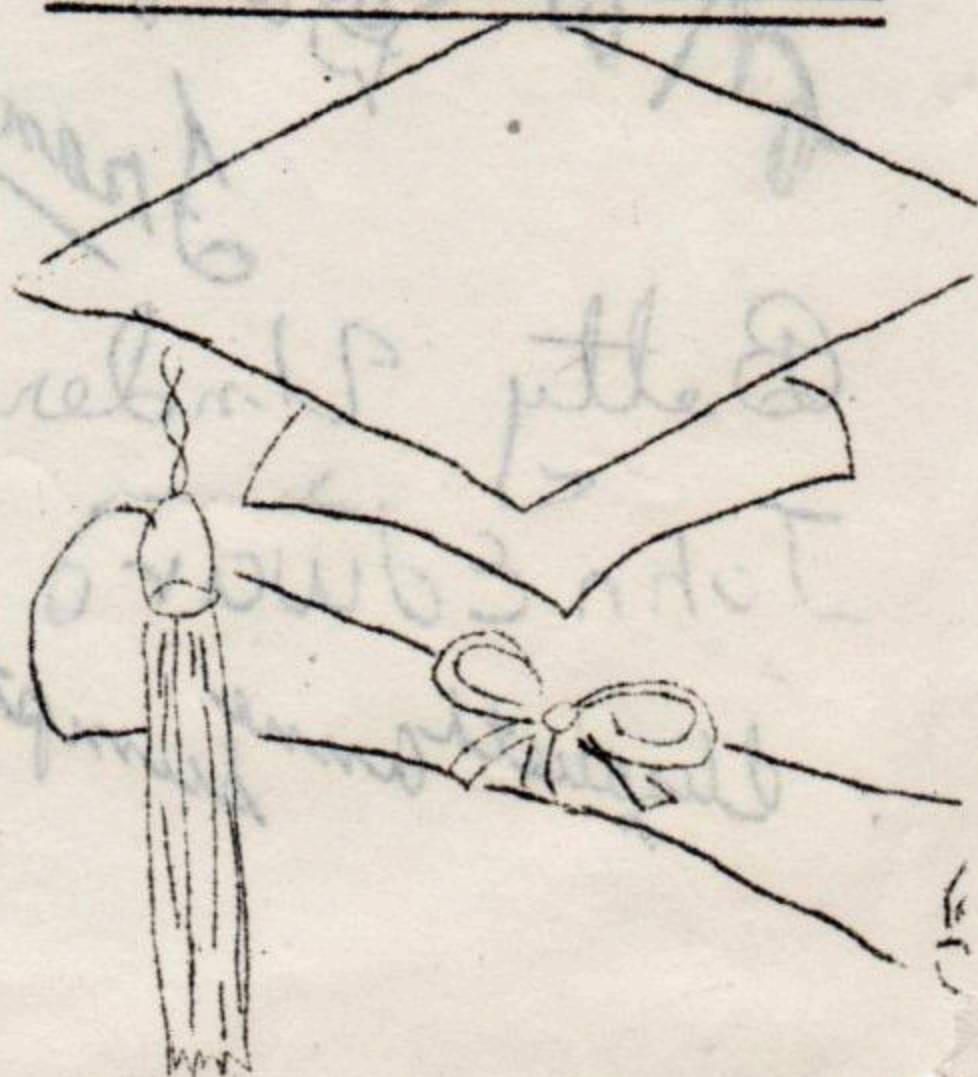
