REPORTS REVISED FOR HIGH SCHOOL

A new revised report card has been selected by the faculty of HHS and will be used for students in grades seven through twelve.

The cards will be distributed on Friday and must be returned on the following Monday.

These report cards have seven divisions to represent the seven periods of the day.

In each division there is a place for the teacher to grade a student on scholarship, citizenship and to indicate how many classes have been missed.

Scholarship grades are taken from daily recitations, special projects, preparation for class, scores on tests, and they are the evaluation of the work the student has done during a particular six weeks period.

Citizenship takes into consideration the actual behavior, promptness, making good use of time, following directions, respecting property, and showing in every way possible that he has assumed his responsibility.

Arrangements have been made with the Arkansas State Health Department and the American Medical Association to offer a self-help medical training course at HHS. STUDENTS HOLD MOCK ELECTION

Tuesday, November 3 students voted at HHS and Senator Barry Goldwater won over incumbent President Lyndon Johnson with a margin of 78% to 22%.

Incumbent Governor Orval Faubus won over Republican nominee Winthrop Rockefeller by a margin of 76% to 24%.

Democrat Nathan Gordon won over Travis Beeson for lieutenant governor 71% to 25%.

For Secretary of State Kelly Bryant won from the Republican nominee 74% to 26%.

Amendment 51 carried 55 to 51 and 52 won by 71% of the votes.

Amendment 53 got 93% of the votes cast. Amendment 54 won by 64%.

Amendment 55 (legalized gambling) was defeated 55% to 45%.

Amendment 56 carried 78 to 22 and Amendment 57 carried 83 to 17.

Dickie Lunsford made the rally speech for Senator Goldwater and Tommy Ashby for President Johnson.

Votes were counted by students in Mrs. Doty's government.

The Marvell Mustangs defeated the Hughes Blue Devils 33 to 6 on October 30 on the Marvell field.

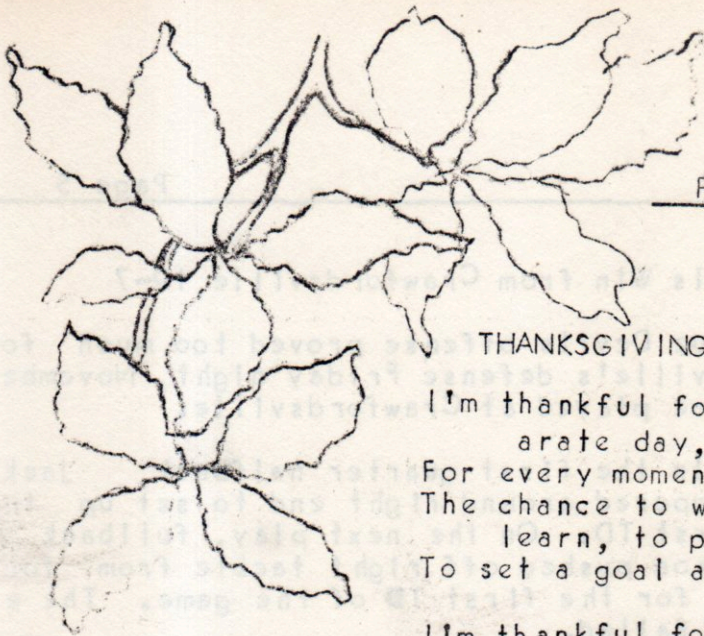
The Mustangs scored on the second play from scrimmage and continued scoring throughout the game.

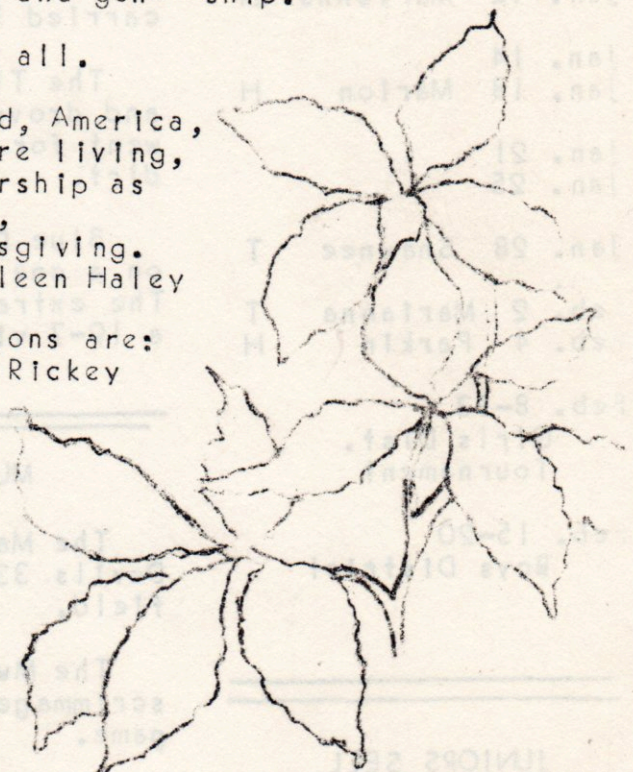
TEN SENIOR BOYS END FOOTBALL SEASON AT WILSON

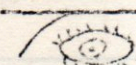

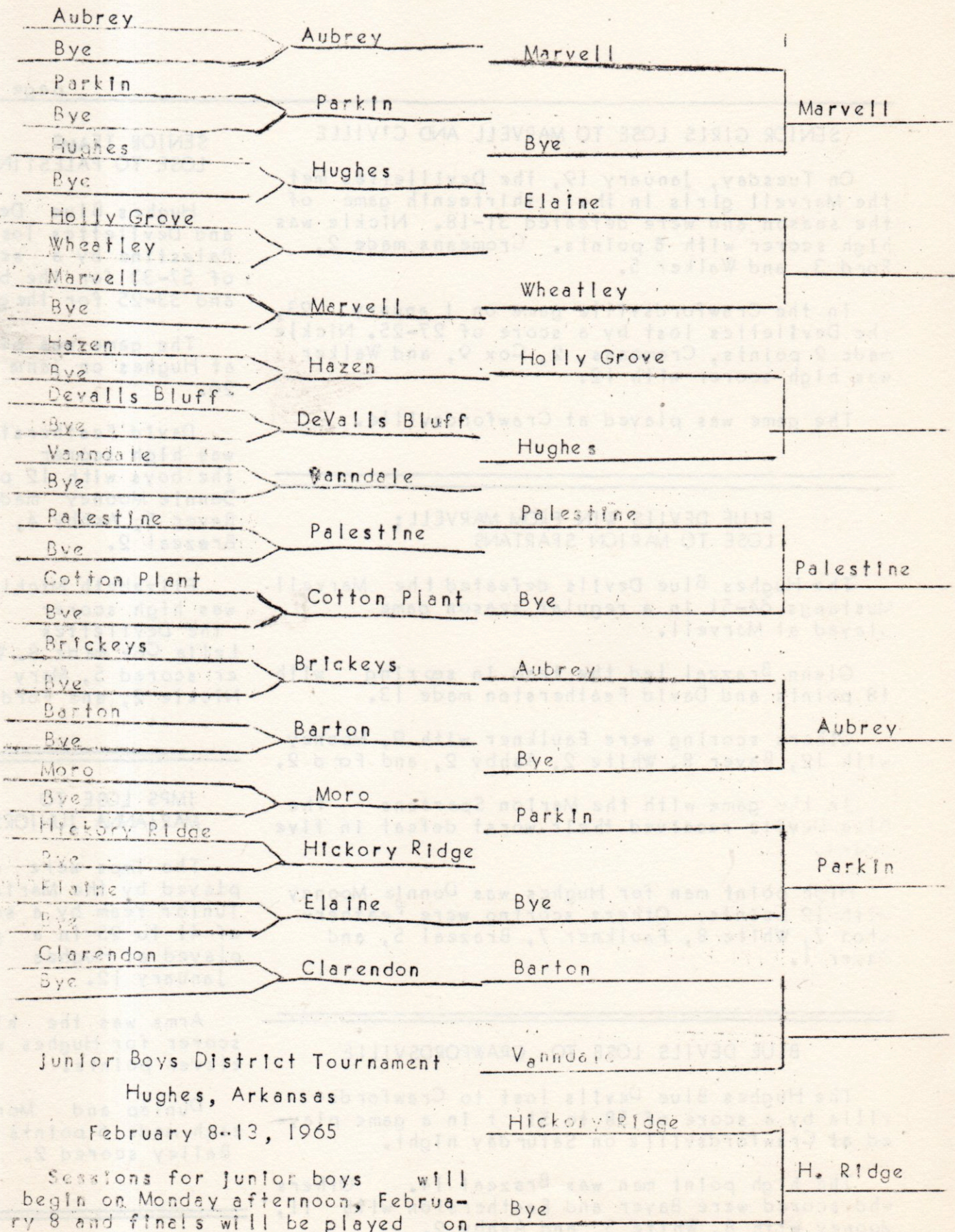

Lynne Till is one of many who achieved the "smooth 'n Sleek" look. Her lazy flip makes an ideal hairdo for windy school days.

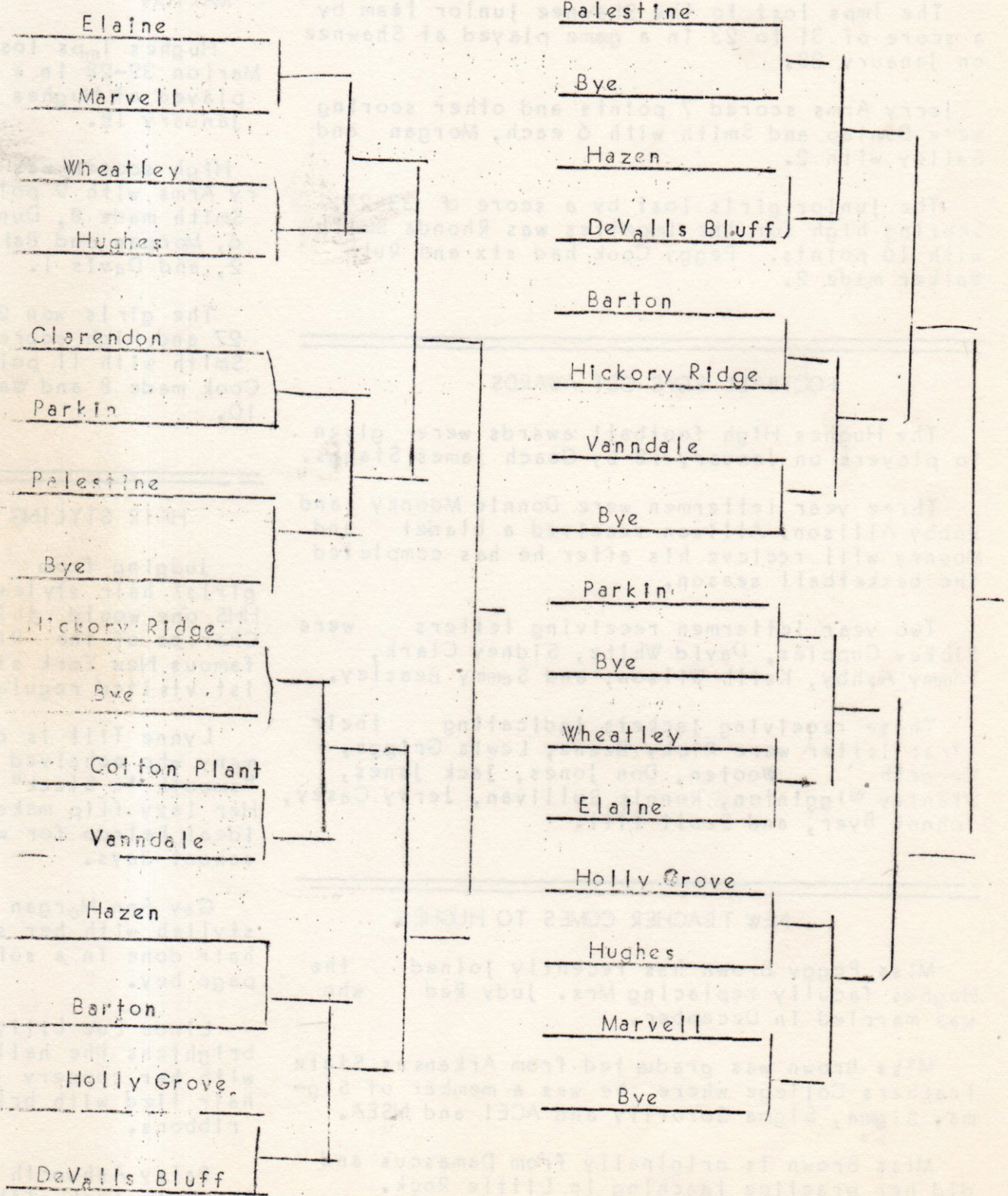

Any senior who has a family income of less than \$3000 may qualify for aid under this program. An additional \$500 is added for each dependent.

The U. S. army is offering advanced GI training to high school seniors who will agree to serve four years in the army upon completion of four years of college.
