In the event of fire these things should be done:

1. Class should be dismissed immediately.
2. Students leave everything behind except coats, if nearby, and purses.
3. Students should leave a row at a time. Do not run.
4. Students assigned should close windows.
5. If a fire or wind storm bell is sounded between periods, students should go to the designated area for the previous class room.
6. Students in offices, lounges, and rest rooms, go as quickly as possible on the most direct route to the designated area for class in progress.

This gave the Devils a 0-5, and 0-2 record in the conference.

STUDENTS PRACTICE IN DRIVER SIMULATOR

The Driver Simulator was delivered on December 12 to the Hughes School and will be here until the first week of the second semester. It has 12 driving consoles in it which are interconnected electronically with each film as each film is run through the projector. When a driving error occurs, the driver of the car is able to see the mistake as a red light and the mistake is also printed on a piece of paper. The mistakes are recorded as numbers and these numbers refer to a mistake.

There is a series of films lasting from 12 to 35 minutes. These take a driver from the basic driving movements on through night driving, freeway driving, and hazardous driving situations.

The simulator is one of sixteen that the Arkansas State Police furnish on request to any public school in Arkansas.

The filming and various other aspects of the simulator were accomplished by All-State Insurance Company: The price of the simulator and all of its equipment costs approximately \$30,000.

The driver education class will use the simulator but as time permits other students will become familiar with it.

Hughes High School which is serving as reporter for the Arkansas Association of Student Councils was scheduled to have representatives at an executive meeting on Saturday, December 10 at Hall High School in Little Rock. Delegates were unable to attend because of bad weather.

Twelve committee members made up the North Central Survey team which spent two days in the Hughes High School last week making a study of the school in keeping with the regular re-evaluation which has been set up for regular intervals by the association.

Chairman of the committee was Mr. Charles Cross of the University of Arkansas with Mr. D. F. Price of the State Department of Education who is the local supervisor.

Other members of the committee were Mr. Calvin Hastings of Helena, Mr. Sam Bratton, Earle; Mr. Orville Roberts, superintendent of schools, Paragould; Mr. John Hazelbaker, principal at Augusta; Mr. Joe Spades, principal at Walnut Ridge, Mr. Lewis Hawley, principal, Forrest City; Mr. Leslie Speck, superintendent of schools Holly Grove; Mr. T. M. Goatcher, state department of education; and Mr. Curtis Swain, assistant commissioner of education, Mr. Omar Stevens, and Mr. James Allbright all of the state department. Mr. Ralph Johnson of Shawnee was an observer.

The group began work on Wednesday morning, January 11 and concluded their study at noon, Thursday. A community wide dinner was held in the cafeteria on Wednesday evening with Mr. Curtis Swain as the speaker.

All aspects of the educational program in grades 7-12 were viewed and reports which had been written by the faculty were studied.

Final comments from the committee will be returned to the school in about three weeks. These will contain suggestions for improvement and recommendations to further the North Central program in the Hughes School.

The local high school has been a member of the North Central Association since 1934. This is the first complete study which has been made since that time. These studies are planned for every seven years.

Mr. Roy Stobaugh, superintendent, has expressed his appreciation to the faculty, the student body, and the PTA committee which was responsible for many of the activities which were carried on during the time of the visitation.

SPACE PROGRAM TO BE PRESENTED

Students and teachers of Hughes High School will be figuratively blasted into orbit on Tuesday morning, February 28 when they attend a unique space-science demonstration.

Mr. Joe Hartsfield, a science-education specialist, utilizing authentic scale models and performing dramatic experiments will review U. S. Space exploration programs. He is from the Marshall Space Flight Center, Huntsville, Alabama. The one-hour program is an educational feature of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The imposing array of models includes the Saturn family of rockets, weather and communication satellites, orbiting observatories, manned spacecraft and moon vehicles. Electronic gadgets will be used to illustrate basic scientific principles of space research and exploration.

In their first tournament game they had defeated Marvinell 39-12. Stephen Young scored 10 points.

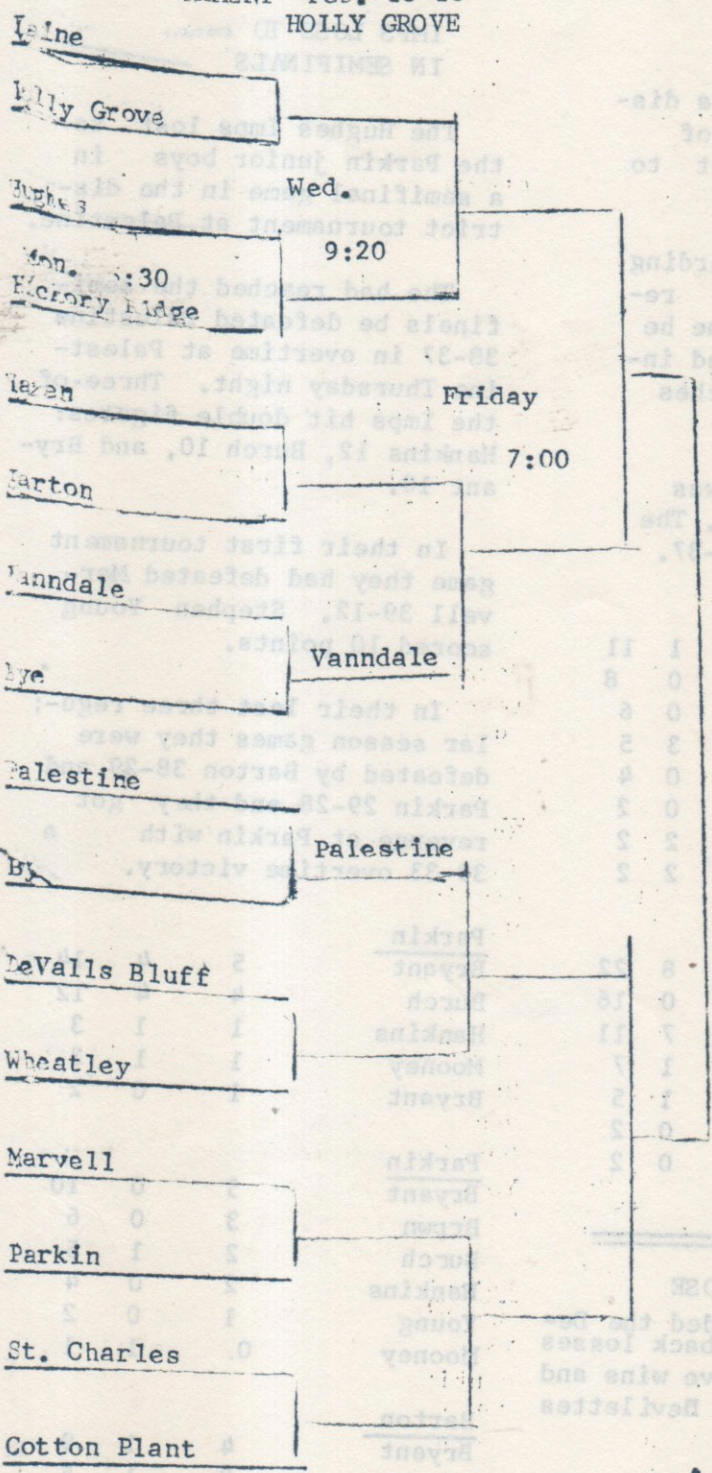
