ARE MADE AT HUGHES

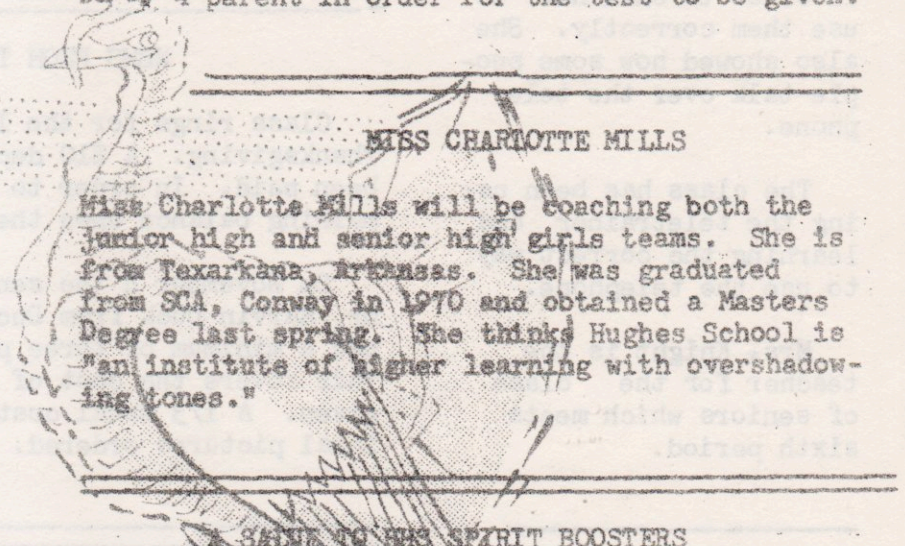
Tuesday, November 2 was the date for the taking of all school day pictures at Hughes High. These should be returned in early December and students who had pictures made now owe \$2.25.
