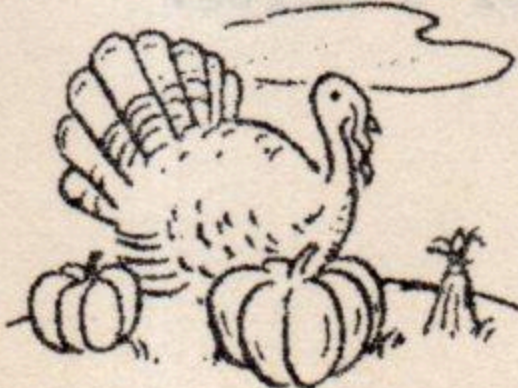

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## STUDENTS HOLD MOCK ELECTION AT HUGHES HIGH SCHOOL

On November 6 the student council held a mock election with the following results: Senator George McGovern 106 over 92 for President Nixon. Governor Dale Bumpers had 187 over Len Blaylock's 23.

68 percent of the senior class cast a vote, 62 per cent of the junior class and only 45 percent of the sophomores. In campaigning Carole McKenzie was President Nixon and Shirley Curtis was Spiro Agnew. Donnie Williams represented McGovern with Clayton Willis as Sargent Shriver. Karen Bartee spoke for Governor Bumpers and Belinda Dotson for Len Blaylock.

The ballot was a replica of the one used in St. Francis County and revealed that students did not read the entire ballot and voted on only a few positions on the ballot, turning in many positions unmarked.

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## FOOTBALL FIELD NEARS COMPLETION

"The new football field for Hughes High School will be one of the finest in the state of Arkansas," stated Superintendent of Schools, Roy Stobaugh when discussing the new facility located on highway 38. The land was purchased for the price of \$15,000, the fence for \$6000 and the bleachers for \$10,000. The grass and sod were donated by the soil conservation service and planted by summer NYC workers.

Ninety-six 1500 watt lights are lighting the field. A concession stand will be located at the end of the bleachers on each side of the field. Dressing rooms will be built in the northwest corner and public restrooms will be located under the visitors' bleachers.

A gravel parking area will cover the area between the fence and the highway. Completion is set for July 1, 1973, and will have a seating capacity of 2500 which hopefully will be filled.

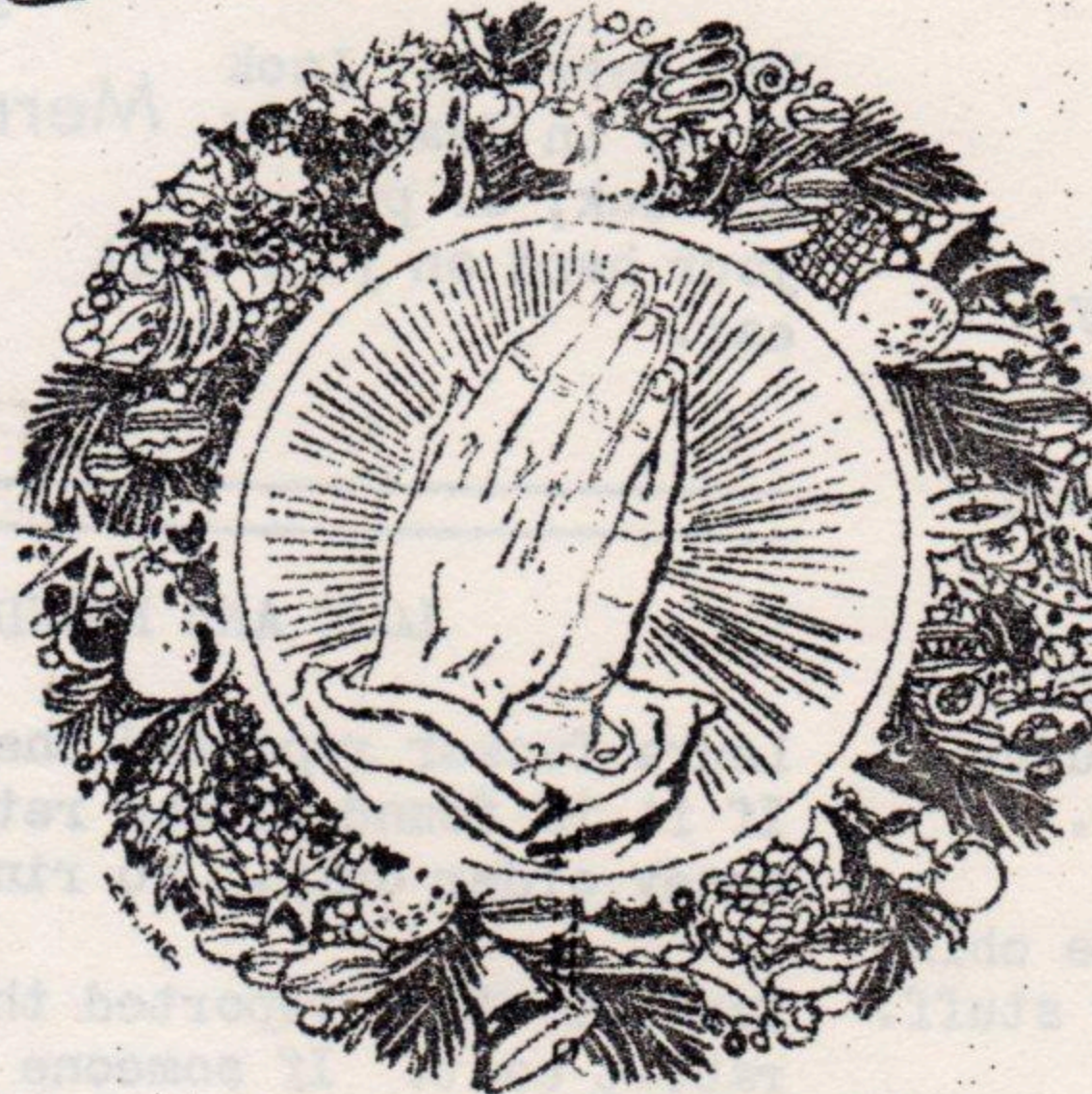

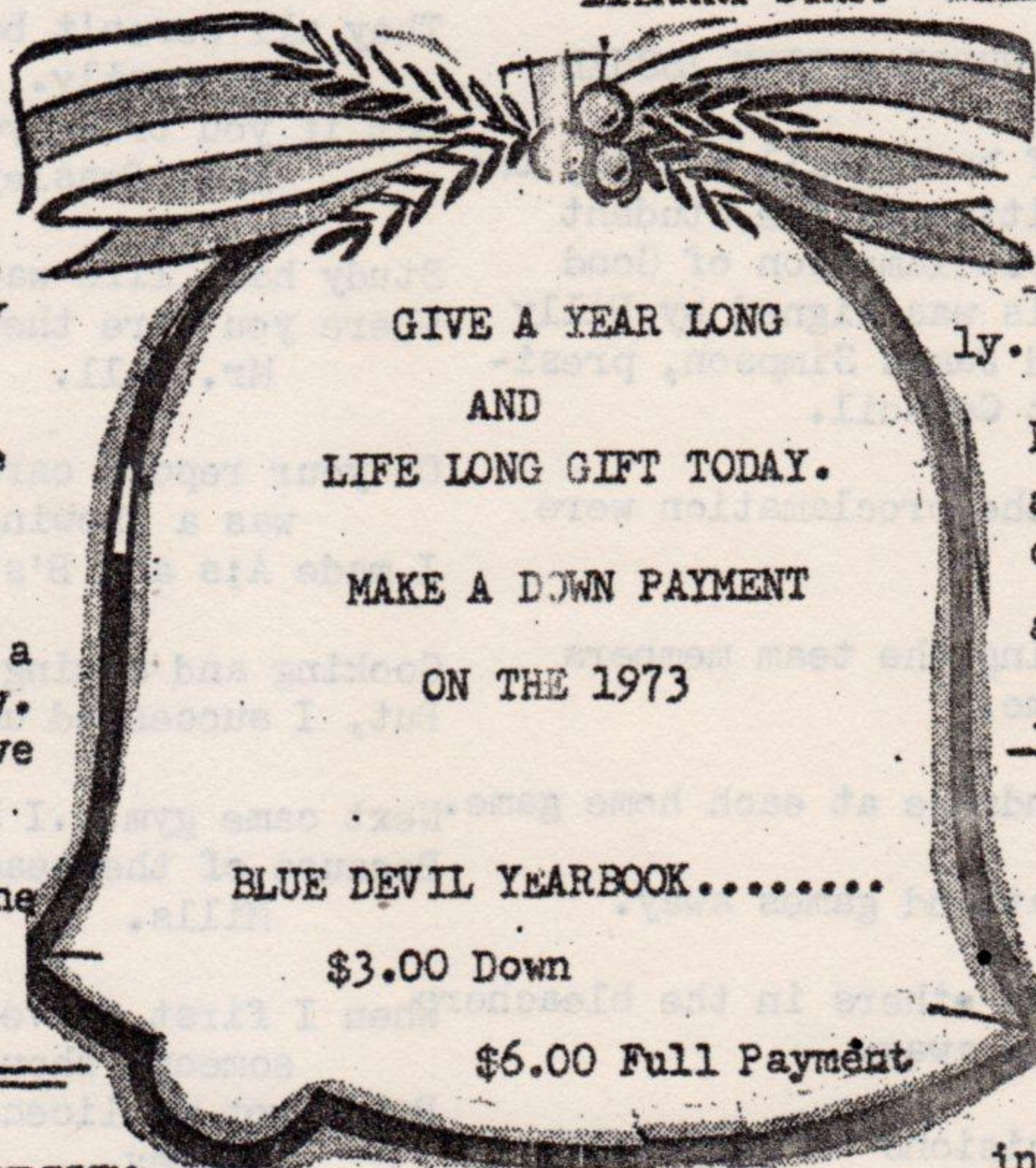

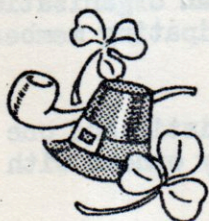
Having been in competition with other schools of the region since the beginning of the sports season, this was a fitting finale for HHS.

Those who did not make a complete payment at the time the book was ordered are asked to complete payment on the book by April 1.

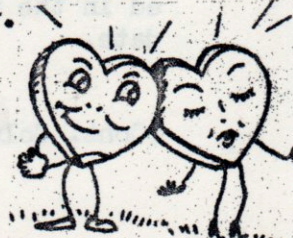
## COUNCIL OBSERVES TEACHER APPRECIATION WEEK IN FEBRUARY

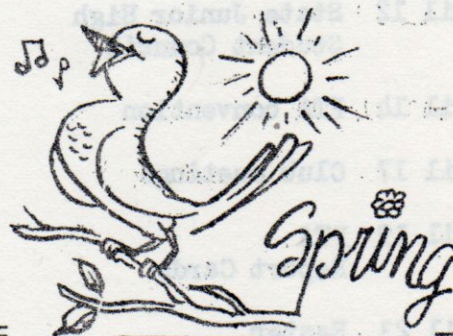
