No students in grades nine and ten qualified for national recognition.

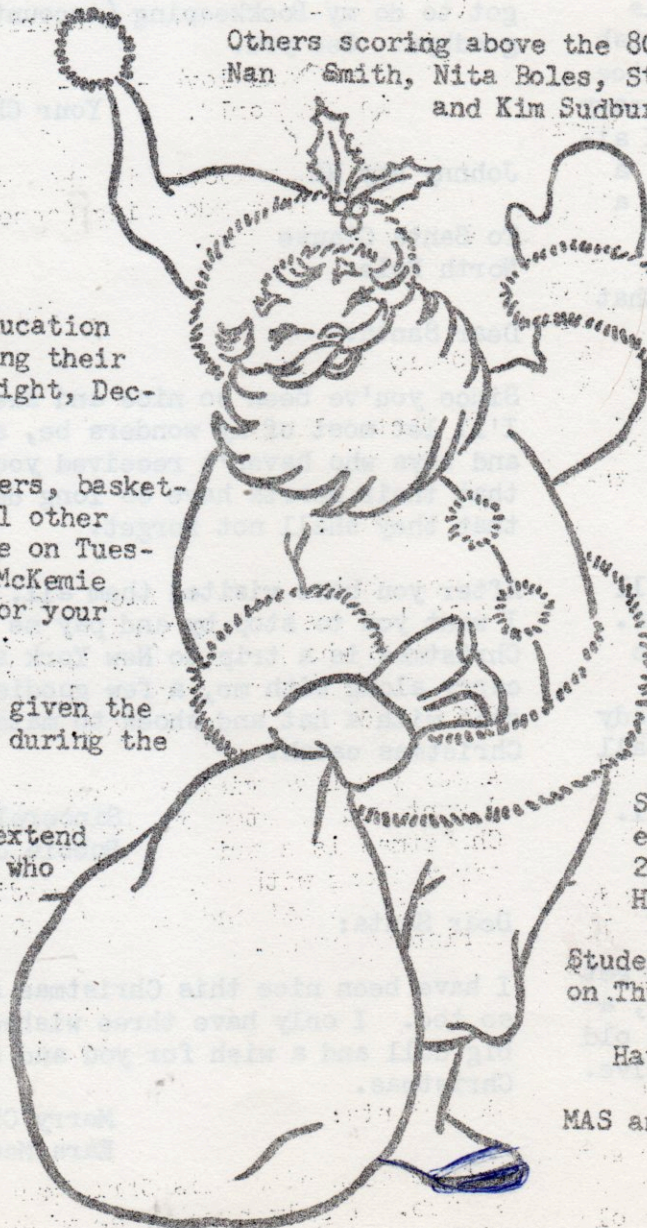
The test was administered locally on October 22 to any student in grades 7-10 who wished to make a payment and take the test.
