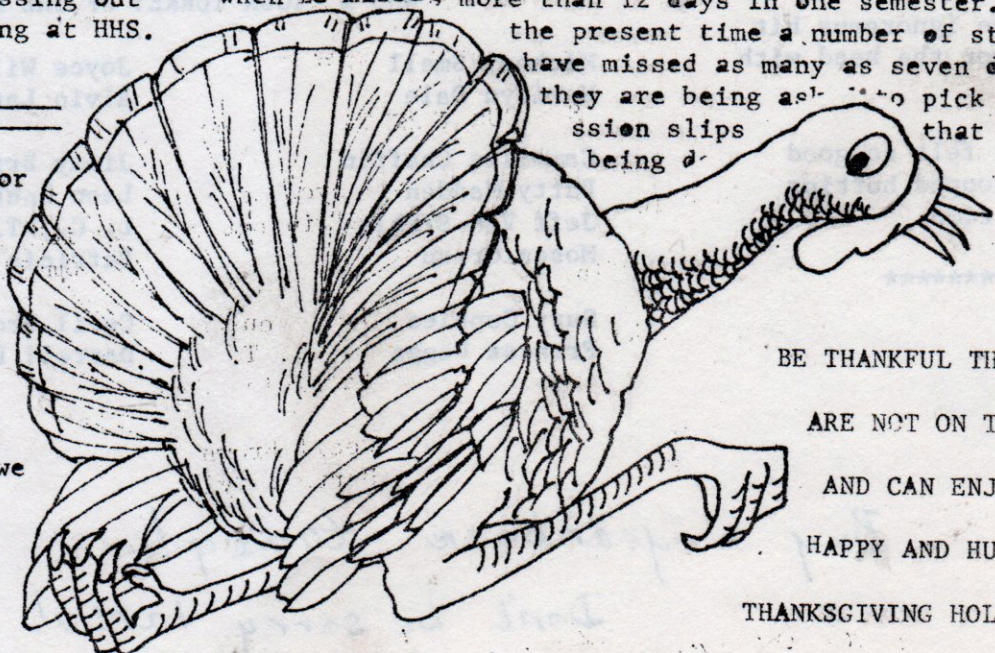

Up to \$2.50 in expenses went into the doors. The student council reimbursed those showing receipts for money spent.

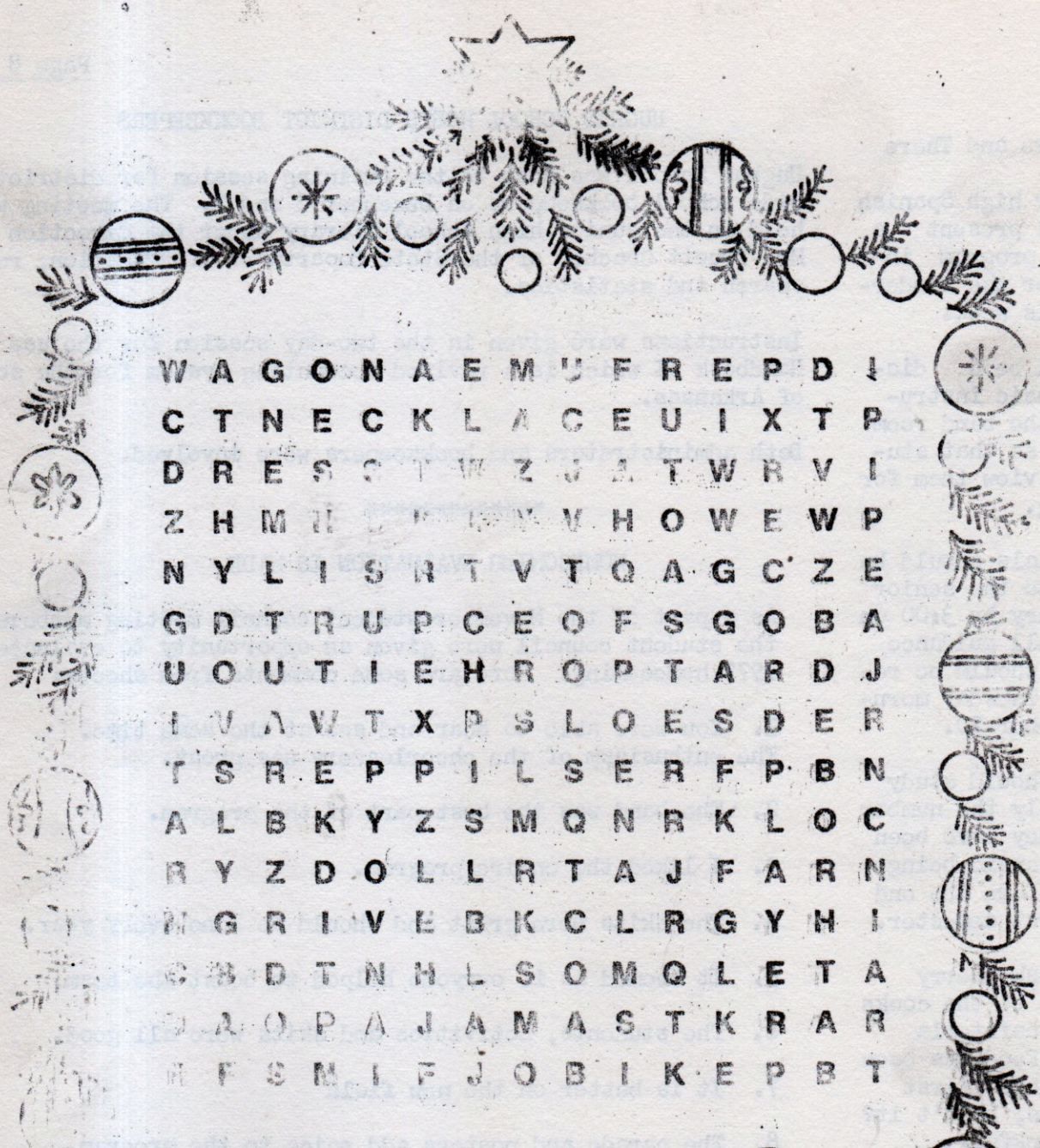

MARCH 1 IS DEADLINE FOR IMMUNIZATIONS

Please take your immunization card to a doctor, the health center, or to a clinic to get your records up-to-date. The card must be signed by someone in charge of the facility you visit. Once the card is completed it is to be taken to the counselor's office where information will be copied and kept on file.

The following is a direct quote from Section XII, Acts 244 of 1967 and 633 of 1973:

"No child will be admitted to a public or private school of this state irrespective of grade or transfer, who has not been immunized or is not in the process of being immunized.

.....Responsibility for enforcement of these Acts rests equally with each school district of this State and the parent or the guardian of the pupil, and each of them shall be liable for permitting any violation of these acts."

The card must be completed by the opening of school in the fall for the 1978-1979 school year or the student will not be permitted to enroll.

Robert Earl Davis, a participant in the Army ROTC at ASU came to NHS to recruit and inform seniors about the advantages of the program.

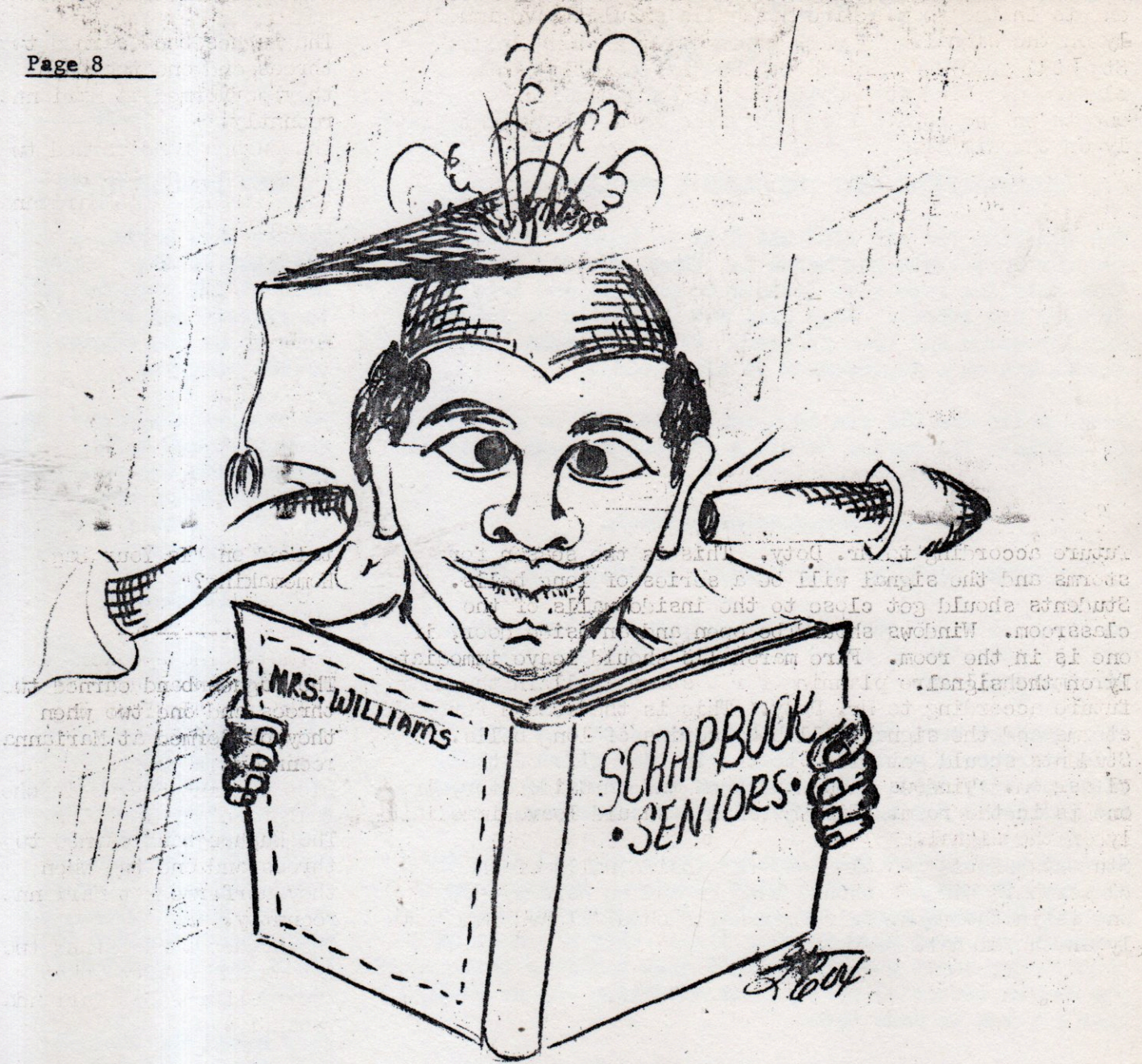

National Library Week was observed with several activities this year. Visitors to the library were given an opportunity to work out an activity each day. Attractive and varied displays were on exhibit.

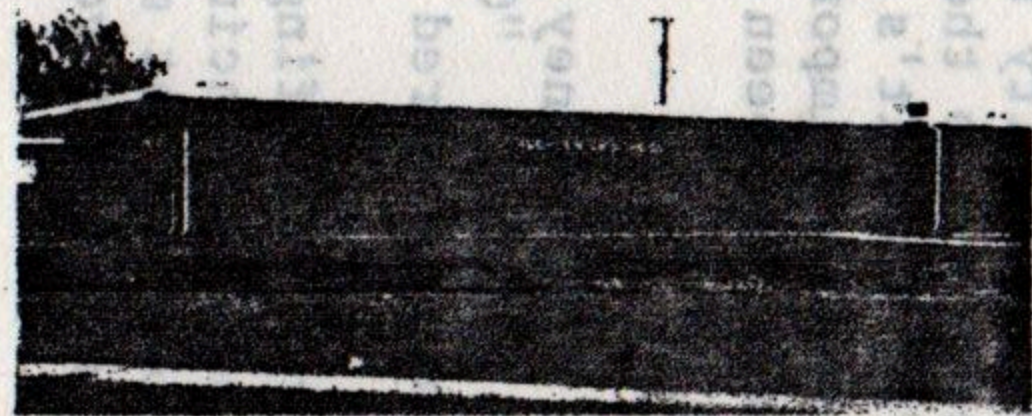
Two days were devoted to local writers and their works were shown. One day featured local artists, and one day a display of items from various places around the world was shown.

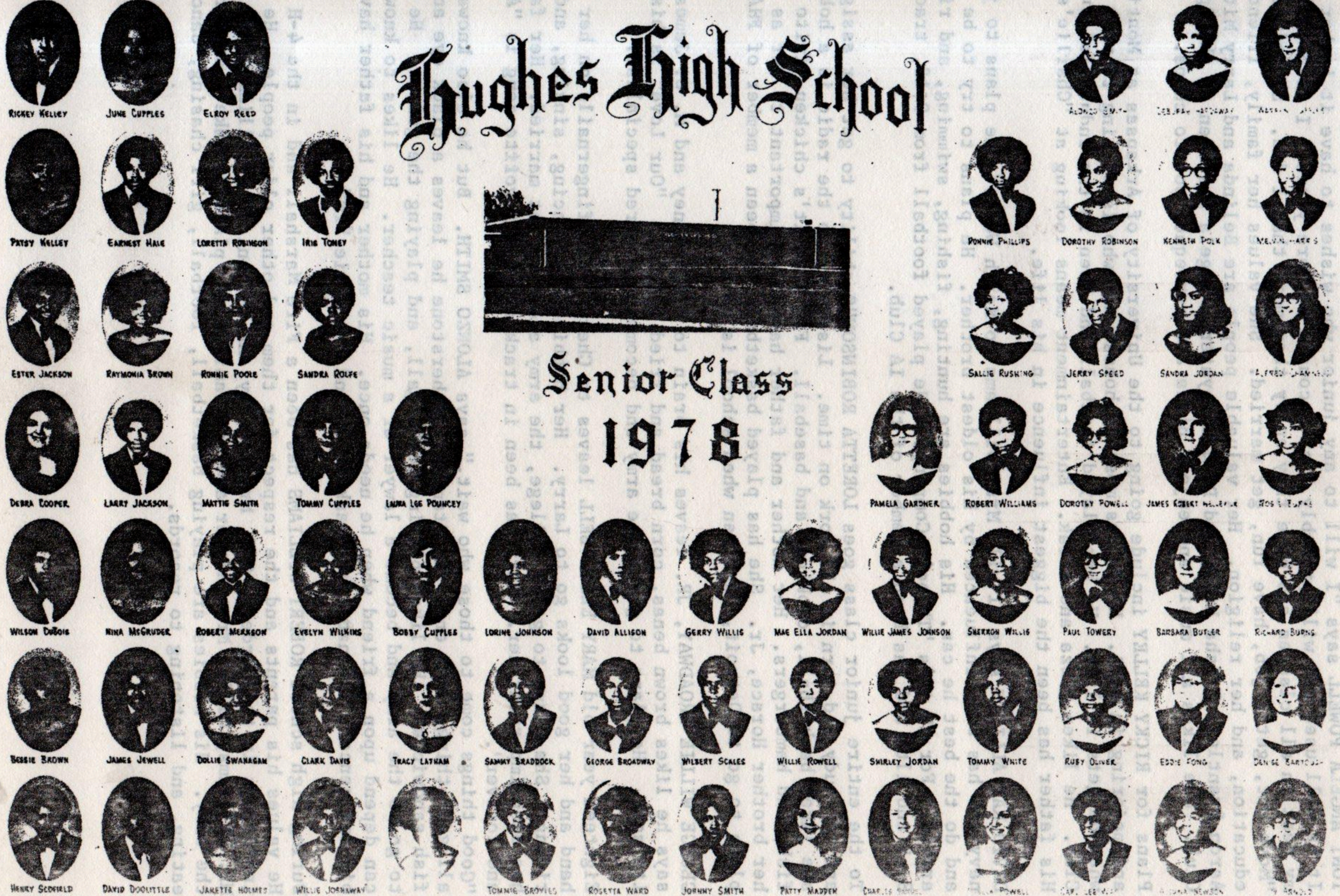
