Homecoming was based on "Fantasy Land" with the slogan: "The Devil sign in '79--Victory". On October 19 there was an assembly on the football field during the day.

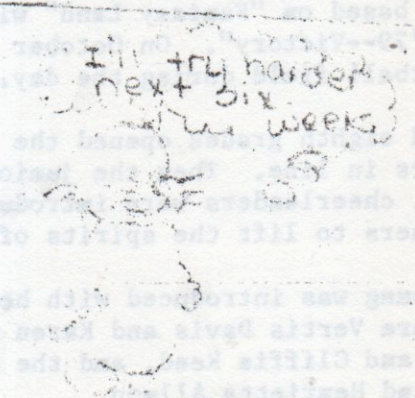
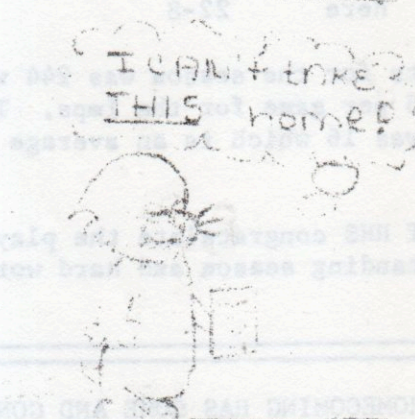
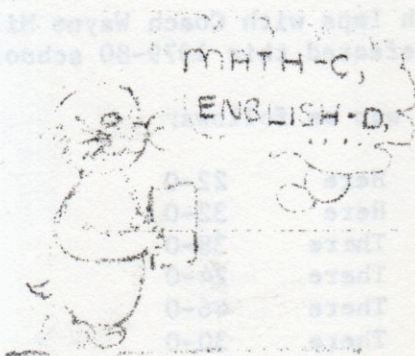

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STUDENT COUNCIL ATTENDS MEET

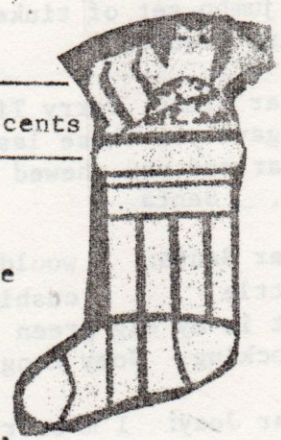

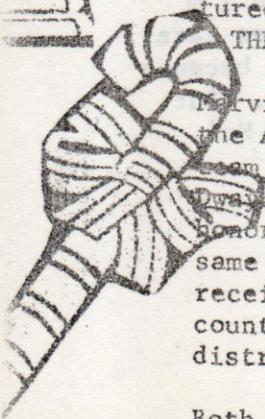
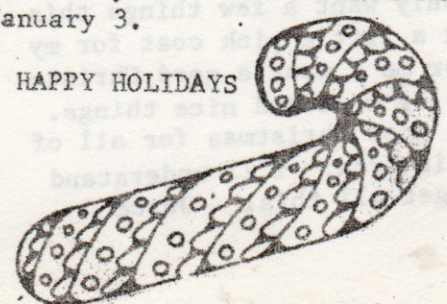
Both Vince Cupples and Edward Jackson were all-district.

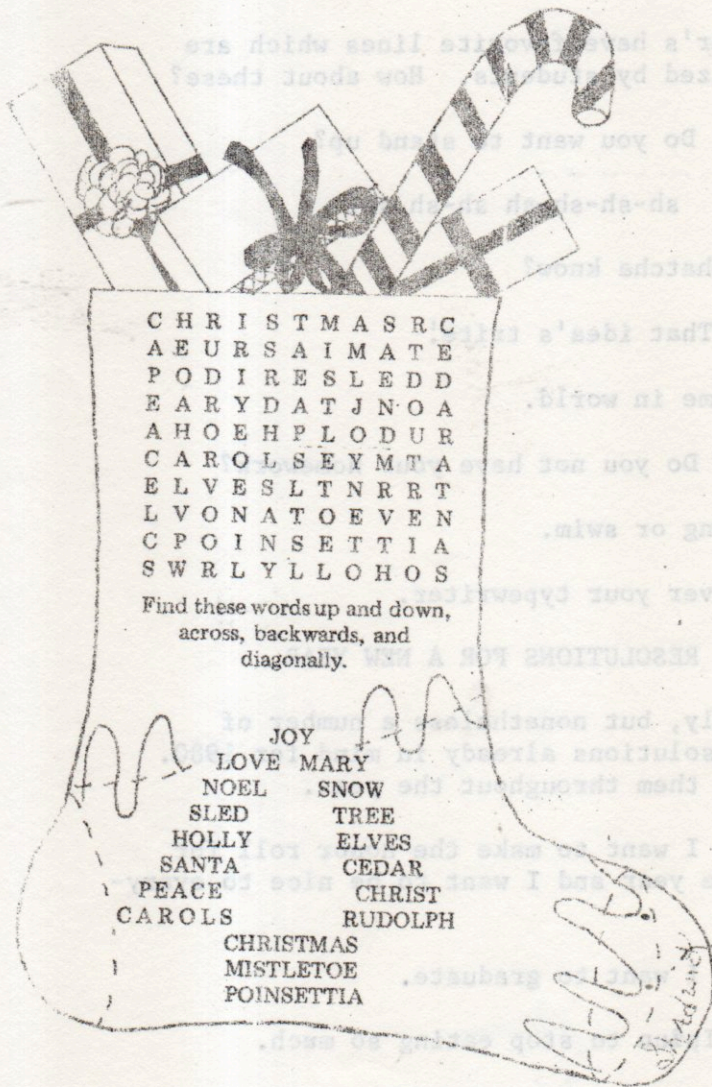

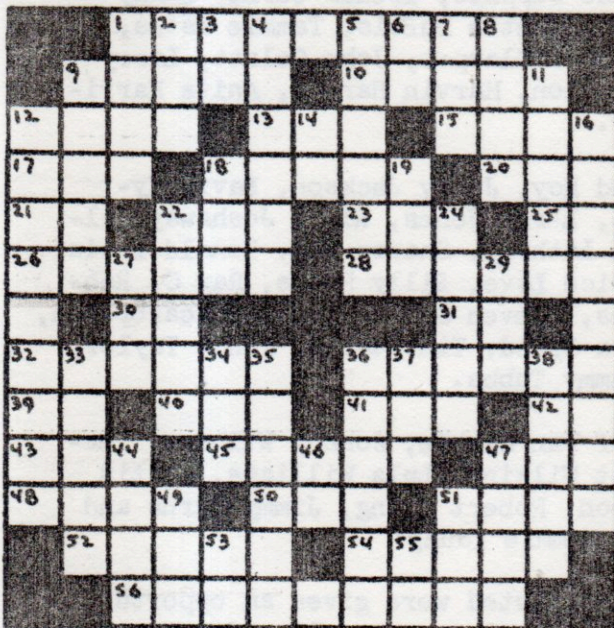

YOUR TV AND RADIO CAN HELP DETECT TORNADOES

Spring time is the time of increased tornado activity. A few helpful hints will help you and your family to be prepared for this season. When a tornado warning has been issued for your area, you can use your radio and TV sets to estimate how close it is.

Use the TV first. Warm it up and tune to Channel 13. Make the screen almost black. Now turn to Channel 2, keeping the volume down.

A tornado within 15 to 20 miles will produce a totally white screen that remains white, or colored on color sets. Lightning, by contrast, produces momentary white (or colored) bands of varying widths. Tornadoes and lightning generate signals near the frequency of Channel 2 (55MC) which override the brightness control. Channel 13, at the high end of the frequency band, is not affected. This is why the screen is darkened on that channel.

If your Channel 2 screen is all white or all colored, turn off the TV, grab your portable radio and find shelter.

Use the radio for emergency broadcasts. But if it is turned to the 550KC band, lightning will produce intermittent static but a tornado will produce continuous static. That's how you can tell if it is still in your vicinity.

Most homes have these two simple warning devices. You might want to copy down these instructions and keep them handy during the tornado season.

Newton Weller of a West Des Moines developed this detection system.

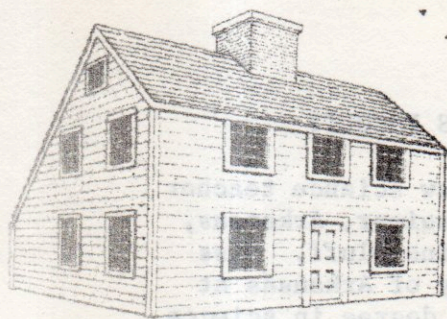

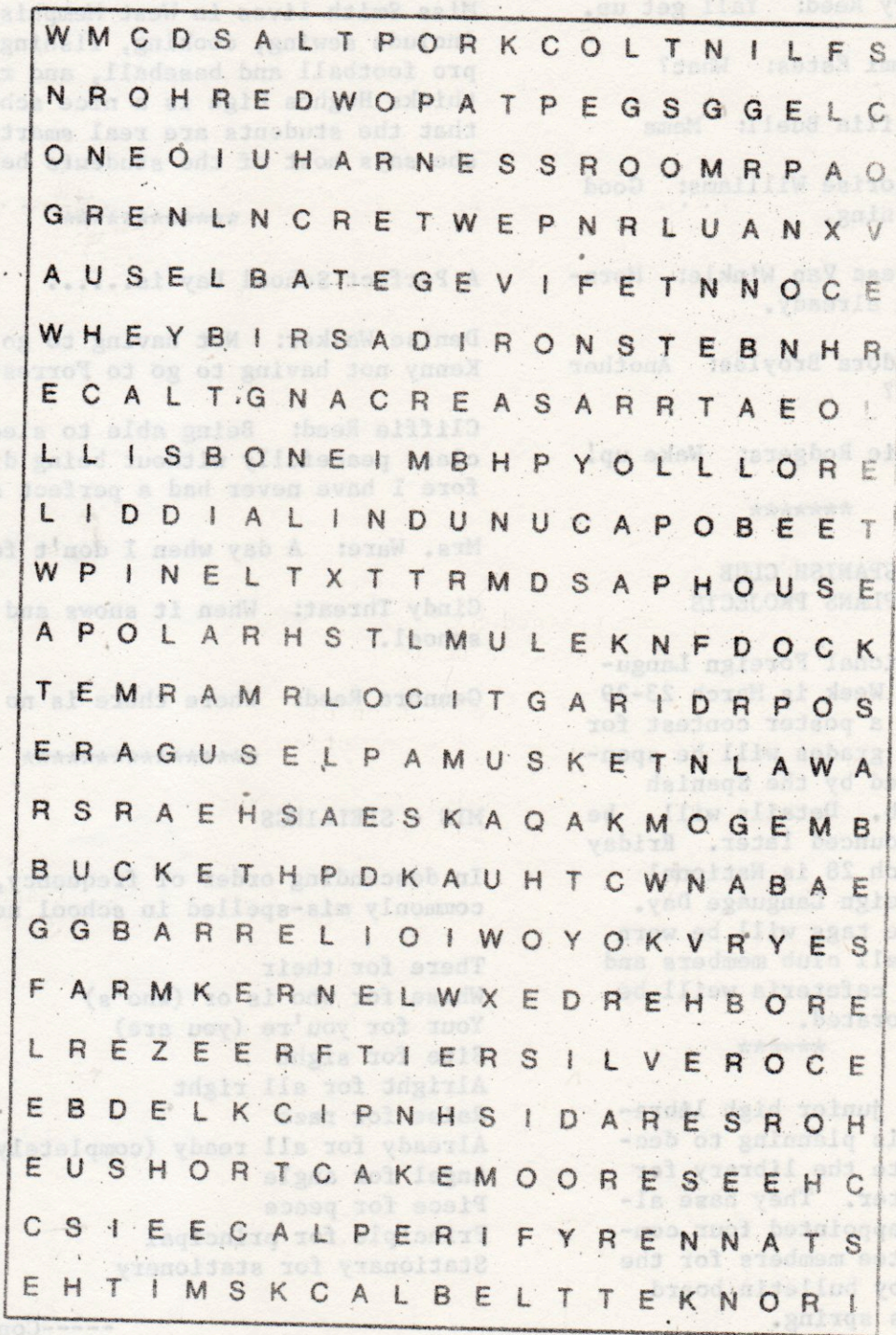

## HISTORY TEAM PLACES THIRD AT EACC

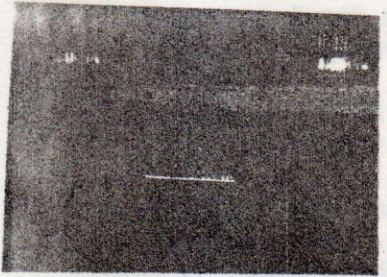
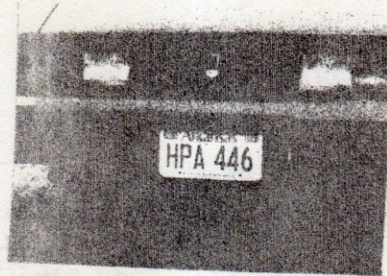
A team of four in American History won third place in their first year to compete in the EACC annual contest.

I would like to know how many of us would go crazy if the TV blew a fuse. Would you run over to your neighbor's house and look through the window at their set?

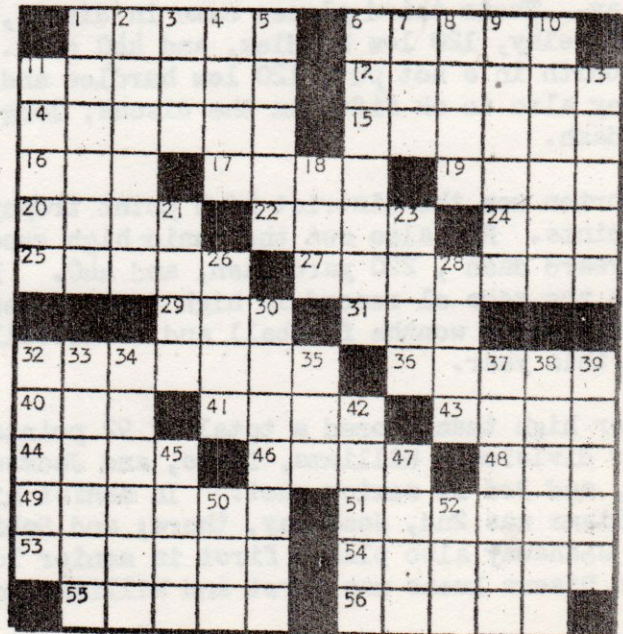
