### THE IMPS ARE UNDEFEATED

The Imps are now at 3-0-1 following a 22-0 victory over Brinkley, a 14-0 victory over Forrest City B, and a 16-14 come-from-behind win over the Marvell Colts.

At Brinkley the Imps scored a touchdown within the first two minutes. Another touchdown early in the second quarter made it 15-0. With 4:35 left in the game the Imps made another touchdown bringing the final score to 22-0. Brinkley was held to only three first downs.

The game with Forrest City B was scoreless until the third quarter when the Imps went ahead 7-0 on a 53 yard run. By the end of the contest the score was 14-0. The opposition was held to only three first downs compared to nine for the Imps. Lester Williams led in rushing with over 90 yards. On defense Sylvester White and Benny Tate each had six tackles.

When Marvell jumped ahead 0-8 in the first minute of play, all knew the Imps had their work cut out for them. Things began to look grim when the Colts completed a 70 yard pass for a touchdown bringing the score to 0-14. After the half the Imps began to make up the difference and scored a touchdown early in the third quarter.

Later in the third quarter, the Imps scored another touchdown. The two-point conversion tied the game at 14 all. Late in the fourth quarter a Hughes put the Colts very deep in their own territory. The Imps blitzed and Sylvester White sacked the quarterback in the end zone for the game-winning safety. The final score was Imps 16, Colts 14. The leading rusher for the Imps was Lester Williams with 94 yards. Michael Smith was the leading tackler with six tackles and one assist.

## BLUE DEVIL BAND ENDS

### SPECTACULAR MARCHING SEASON

The 1983 marching season of the Hughes Blue Devil Band has come to a close, but the excitement of a winning season is still in the air.

The first competition took the Hughes Band to Paragould, Arkansas for the Paragould Invitational Marching Contest on October 15. First division ratings were earned by the band, flag line, and rifle line. A second division rating went to the drum major. The band was also named first in Division Class A Bands, and to top off the day, the Hughes Band was awarded the honor of Grand Champion of the contest, based on receiving the highest score of all competing bands.

The Region IX Marching Contest was held on October 18 in West Memphis. First division awards went to the band, flag line, rifle line, drum major, and percussion line. Bands from Missouri, Tennessee, Mississippi, and Arkansas participated in the contest. The band, flag line, rifle line, and drum major received first division awards. In Class A band competition, the Hughes band took the first place award. Placing third overall in the ASU contest, Hughes followed Missouri's Poplar Bluff High School Band ranking second, and the Jonesboro Hurricane Band being named winner of the competition and recipient of the Donald R. Minx Memorial Award.

To climax the season, the Hughes Band journeyed to Little Rock on November 5 to compete in the Central Arkansas Marching Championship at War Memorial Stadium. In preliminary competition, first division awards were taken by the band, flag line, rifle line, drum major, and percussion line. After preliminary competition concluded, the

top ten scoring bands were named, and for the third consecutive year, Hughes earned the chance to compete for top honors in the evening's Finals Competition.

Although Arkansas has no official state marching contest, the Central Arkansas Championship is considered the state competition. Bands spanning from Class A to Class AAAA vied for the winning title. Being the smallest band to make the finals, Hughes placed sixth in the Little Rock contest sponsored by McClellan High School. Final results of the contest are as follows: Grand champion and Governor's Cup Winner-Hope; 2nd place-Jonesboro; 3rd place-Mountain Home; 4th place-Arkadelphia; 5th place-Harrison; 6th place-Hughes; 7th place-West Memphis; 8th place-Benton; 9th place-Paragould; 10th place-Bryant.

The Hughes Blue Devil Band is under the direction of Mr. Steve Warner, who is in his seventh year as director of the band. Suzanne Owens served as drum major for the 1983 season. Flag captains were Brenda Bailey, and Mary K. Pittman, while Michelle Dillahunty served as captain of the rifle line. Captain of the percussion line was Rickey Davis.

With a slate of superior ratings, outstanding auxiliary awards, and distinguished honors, the Hughes Band has brought much pride to its school and community. All of the above competitions were made up of contesting bands which include students from grades 10-12. Hughes is an exception, in that they have members in grades 8-12. So maturity and size don't always constitute a winning band. The Hughes Band prides itself in this.

Although music is the main component, discipline, self-control, quality, perfection, and a great sense of accomplishment are all very evident characteristics of this organization-characteristics that each of the members of the Hughes Band will carry with them for years to come.

The Student Printz interviewed Mr. Davidson and found that he was born in Crossett Arkansas. Before coming to Hughes he taught English at Fordyce and Parkin, AR. Mr. Davidson enjoys teaching more than any career that he has held. He said, "A good teacher makes all the difference in whether a class is mediocre or excellent." He added in closing, "I expect the very best of the student body as a whole."

Initiated in the latter part of the nineteenth century, kite photography is popular among some groups today. It was used by William Eddy during the Spanish-American War to record troop movement and action.

Even the army has made use of kites. During World War II the devices were used to simulate enemy aircraft during ground-to-air gunnery practice.

Large kites have even been designed and used to carry men into the sky. The kite, consequently, is not only a plaything for the young, but also a flying device that has aided mankind in a variety of ways.

The best summer jobs go first. Now is the time to look if you want to be employed come June. This year most job openings for teenagers will be found in fast food, recreation, clerical, sales and service occupations, say the job placement experts at ITT Educational Service, Inc., a nationwide network of post-secondary business, trade and technical schools.

Begin your search by making up a list or "resume" of what you have to offer a employer, ITTES says. Skills in typing, shorthand and accounting, good vocabulary and spelling, and knowledge of office machines such as calculators, copiers and audio-visual equipment are big plusses in the summer job market. Are you good at fixing up cars, repairing household items or gardening? List skills like these, too.

If you have been a class officer, or organized a school fund-raising drive, be sure to list it on your resume, along with other school activities, part-time or volunteer jobs and special abilities and interests. List references who are not relatives, including their addresses and phone numbers. Compiling this information will save time when completing job applications.

To find job openings, tell your parents, friends and relatives that you are looking. Ask if they have heard of openings where they work. Call personnel departments of local businesses. Check newspaper help-wanted ads, bulletin boards at school, community and church, and help-wanted signs in store windows. Register with your state Job Service Office (listed in the telephone directory Yellow Pages under "Employment Services").

Teenagers who look early and show imagination and persistence will have the best chance of finding summer jobs, ITTES says.

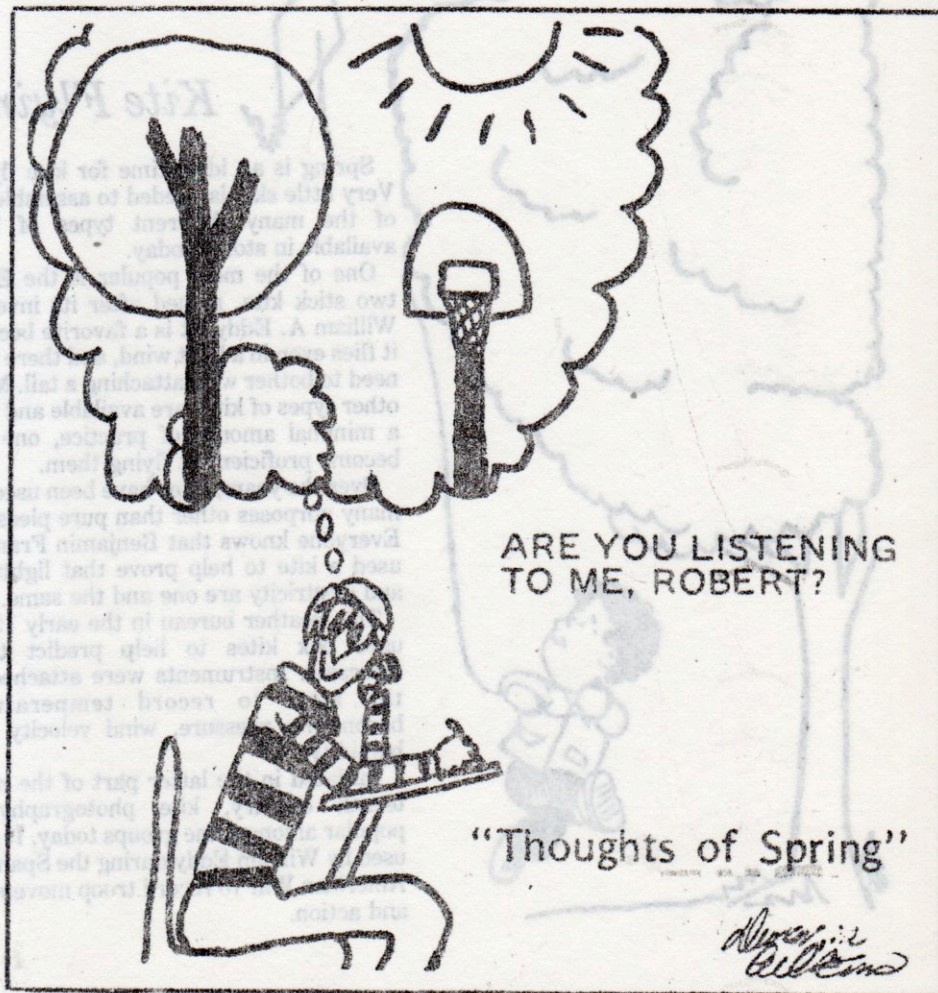
