The Citizen Bee team members are Reggie Davis, Patrick Griggs, and Andre Simmons.

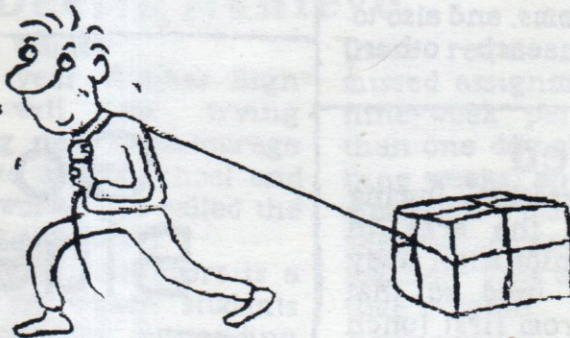
# Quiz Bowl Gears Up

The Homework Hotline is back again to help Arkansas schoolchildren and other family members with school assignments. The toll-free number, 1-800-283-4321, may be called from 4 to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday from anywhere in the state.

Ten teachers are staffing the hotline this fall. The teachers handle calls in their field of expertise.

Four of the teachers can

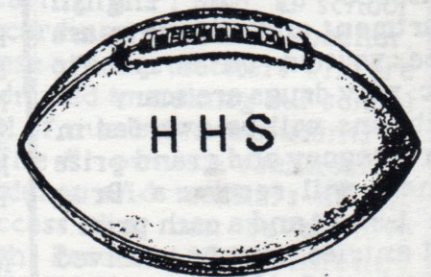
### In New Lot

## Is Channel One on target?

Channel One is the center of a very controversial issue. According to the U.S. News Magazine, "education and commercialism are proving a tough mix."

In launching Channel One, Chris Whittle, the owner of Whittle Productions, planned a twelve minute "news and current events" broadcast to boost the literacy of our nation's teens. But after internal studies, it occurred that the students were not paying attention to Channel One coverage. Therefore, Channel One began airing less "hard news" and more segments on music, movies, and popular teen idols or "fluff" as U.S. News calls it.

This "fluff" partly consisted of total coverage of the 1992 Grammy Awards in New York, a five-part series on teen fashion, and a two-part series on 2 Live Crew.

When asked about her views of informity from Channel One, Vickie Walker, senior at HHS, replied,

"Channel One is both amusing and informative. It is a program that all schools should have."

Channel One is not only making its money from its commercials, but it is also doing some things that are considered

"unprofessional" in broadcast journalism, for instance, adding sound effects to news footage and coaching interview subjects. Last spring, program personnel from Channel One coached a student at a World War II memorial in Japan in order to get footage of her crying, says Charlie Reina, the program's head newswriter.

According to Tyrone Smith, 7th grade, "We only listen to Channel One because there is nothing else to do." Tyrone thinks that Channel One is interesting but not helping the students at HHS very much.

Eighth grader Tina Jones believes that the students listen to Channel One "to learn about certain things." When asked whether

Channel One was helping HHS students, she responded, "Not really. It's not saying anything to affect school, it's only talking about other things, like Somalia."

English teacher, Beth Holland says that "some students listen more than others."

When asked if Channel One is helping HHS students, she replied, "I think it has the potential. But, you can't just show somebody something and expect it to be learned. Stories and subjects ideally should be discussed in class to make a difference. But teachers have so many other responsibilities, that's not always possible."

Channel One obviously has helpful and newsworthy programming, but whether or not Channel One is actually meeting a classroom objective or is simply a tool for making money remains to be seen.

Student reactions to the Banquet and Prom were positive.

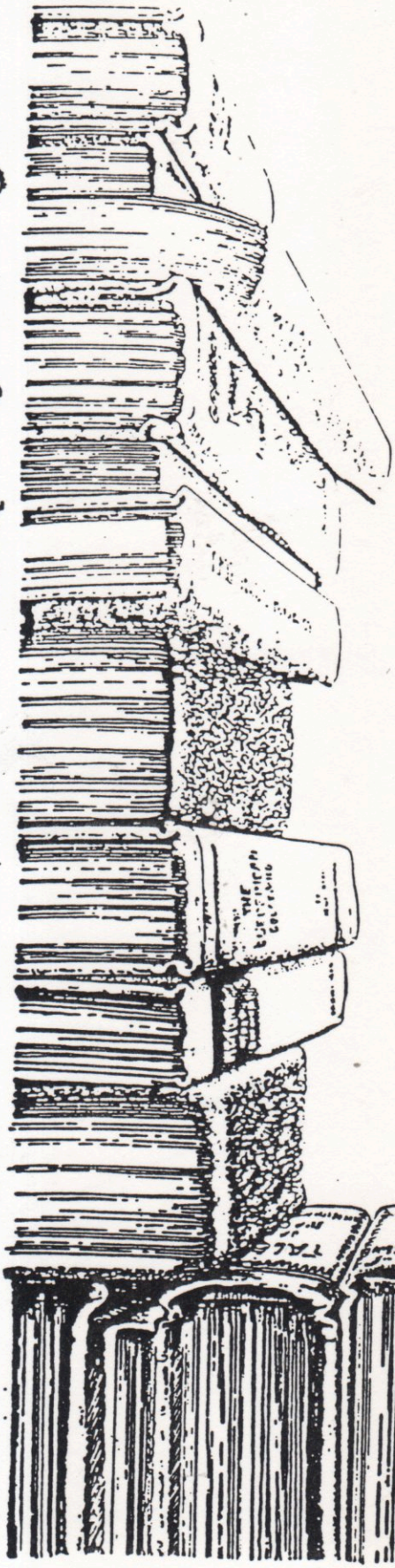
Filda Holmon stated that "the decorations were nice, and there was a variety of music." She also said that the sponsors looked cute dancing, but she really didn't expect them to.

The Banquet and Prom were very nice and the Senior Class is very appreciative to everyone who helped make this evening memorable.



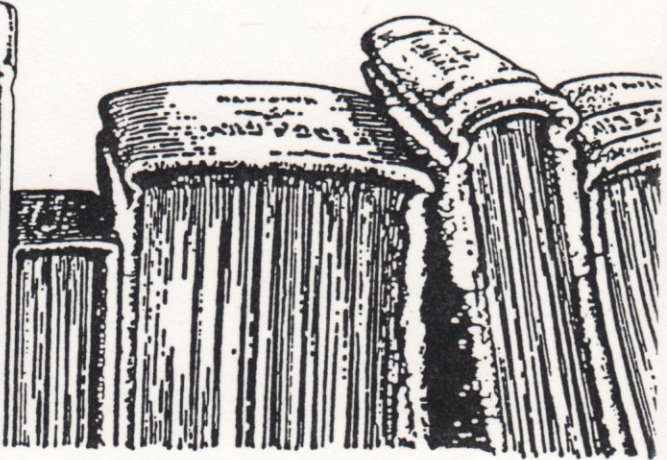
